## FRAYNE KNOCKS OUT YOUNG CORBETT

### CONQUEROR OF TERRY MCGOVERN, OUTCLASSED, SUCCESSFUL IN EIGHTH.

Arena, San Francisco, July 17.—Young Corbett, the one time conqueror of Terry McGovern, proved an easy victim to Young Johnny Frayne of San Francisco, who knocked him out today in the eighth round of a bout scheduled to go 25 rounds. Corbett palpably was not in condition to put up a hard battle and at no time did he appear to have a chance. The men fought at catch weights, weighing in at 125 pounds at 10 o'clock this morning. Corbett, however, failed to make the weight and it was announced that he was fully two pounds in excess of the requirements. The Corbett of today was a mere shadow of the once great lightweight, who but a few years ago electrified the sporting world with his wonderful battles. Today, his famous "haymaker" was ill timed and there was no power behind it.

**Tame and Uninteresting.**  
The contest was a tame and uninteresting affair up to the time of the knockout. In the eighth round Frayne shot right and left, catching Corbett flush on the jaw, and the one-time champion was sent to his haunches for the count of seven. He was dazed and wobbled about the ring until steadied. Frayne, with terrific right and left smashes to the jaw, put him down again. The seconds then threw up the sponge as a token of defeat and the Californian was awarded the verdict by Referee Tim Keeling.  
Jimmy McCarthy was given the decision over Charlie Kelly at the end of the tenth round in a preliminary to the Young Corbett-Frayne fight. Terry Keller and John O'Keefe, welterweights, battled 10 rounds to a draw. Freddie Brooks, the Seattle crick, who was to have met Keller, was injured in an automobile accident last night and O'Keefe was substituted.

## BLACK CHAMP FAILS TO SHOW UP

### JEFFRIES READY TO TALK FIGHT AND ISSUES STATEMENT OF HIS INTENTIONS.

Chicago, July 17.—James J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson failed to meet here today, according to the schedule outlined by their representatives. Jeffries was at the appointed place, but Johnson did not leave his training camp in Indiana until late in the day and said that he would not meet Jeffries.  
Jeffries issued a signed statement later in which he said:  
"In view of the many conflicting reports regarding my intentions, I will make my plans public, as follows:  
"At the conclusion of my theatrical contract, which will be July 25, I will sail for Europe for a two or three weeks' visit to Carlshad. Before sailing I will meet my friends to meet Johnson before the club offering the best inducements and best situated to hold the contest.  
"Sam Berger, who will act as my pugilistic manager, will remain over here and consider offers for the match and will have all the details in readiness for final signature when I return. I sincerely hope that my action will quiet the doubts of those who have questioned the sincerity of my intentions."

**COLLINS IS LEADING BATTER.**  
Chicago, July 17.—Official batting averages of the American league to July 5, inclusive, were made public today. Collins of Philadelphia leads with a percentage of .297 and Lajoie of Cleveland is second with .250. The table indicates one great factor in Detroit's commanding position in the race, as Crawford has been batting .328 and Cobb .322. Lajoie holds the record for two-base hits, having made 16 in the 54 games he is credited with playing. Crawford holds the banner for three-base hits and home runs, with seven of the former and four of the latter.

## MISSOULA OFFERED REMARKABLE FLIGHT FRANCHISE IS MADE

### GARDEN CITY PEOPLE ASKED TO TAKE BUTTE TEAM—WAL-LACE VICTIM TODAY. WRIGHT AEROPLANE REMAINS IN AIR FIFTEEN MINUTES, MAKING FAST TIME.

After having been on a losing streak for a month or more, the management of the Butte team in the Intermountain league yesterday dropped their franchise which was, without a moment's delay, offered by the league officials to Missoula. Manager E. G. Farnsworth of the Bozeman league team spent yesterday in the city talking over the matter with the officials of the Missoula Baseball association trying to get them to take up the franchise, the only thing required by him being the guarantee of the players' salaries by the association. The officials of the association were loth to take up the matter until a line could be gotten on their prospective squad, however, and Mr. Farnsworth left last night without having been given a definite decision. The Missoula officials, however, sent an invitation by Mr. Farnsworth to the Butte team to come down and play the Glants during the week so that the people can see what they think of the team before the franchise is taken.

**Wallace This Afternoon.**  
This afternoon at 2:30 the Glants will clash with the fast Wallace ball-tossers. This aggregation is considered one of the best in northern Idaho and the Glants will meet a foe today worthy of their steel. The line-up of the local aggregation has not been announced as yet, but it is not likely that there will be any radical changes from the line-up of last Sunday. Mains will officiate in the box and Captain Marx will be at the receiving end. "Shorty" Gray will, of course, be out of the game on account of his broken finger, but the outfield will be well taken care of by Whiteman, Dressen and one of the other regular players. The Wallace aggregation is listed to play as follows: McKenzie, catcher; Le. Bee and Hickey, pitchers; Northrup, first base; Card, second base; Smith, shortstop; Murier, third base; Nissen, Bayler and Le. Bee outfielders.  
The Glants will also play a twilight game Monday evening at 6:30.  
On Wednesday the Livingston leaguers will commence a series of twilight games against the home pride. The Wallace aggregation is slated to play on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings against this fact team, which has so far managed to star in the Intermountain league and which ought to prove a good match for the Glants.

**LEGG IS CHAMPION.**  
Des Moines, July 17.—Harry G. Legg of Madison, Wis., today won the Trans-Mississippi golf championship today by defeating Bernard G. Gwynard of the Waveland club of Des Moines by 10 up and 8 to play in the final match at the Des Moines Golf and Country club. Legg played a marvelous game all the way and outclassed his opponent at nearly all stages of the match. In the morning round Legg set a new record for the course by playing 18 holes in 75, two less than the former record.

**NOT IN CONFLICT.**  
Helena, July 17.—District Judge Clements today rendered a decision to the effect that the law passed by the recent legislature raising the salary of jailers is not in conflict with the general law dealing with the emoluments of deputy county officials. The auditor of this county is, therefore, ordered to draw warrants for jailers in the sum authorized by the legislature.

## MAY NEVER RETURN TO BASEBALL GAME



**WILLIE KEELER.**  
New York, July 18.—It is possible that Willie Keeler, the right fielder of the New York Americans, and admittedly the most scientific player in the game, may never again don a spiked shoe. In the recent series with Cleveland, here Keeler was spiked. At first it was thought that the injury was serious enough to keep him out of the game for three or four weeks, but it is now certain that he will not play again this season, and the doctors are fearful that he will never again be able to go on the diamond. It has developed that a tendon was cut just back of the ankle. There is little chance of the tendon healing. As this gives all support to the ankle and makes the foot incapable of service, it can be seen in just what position Keeler is placed.  
For years Keeler has been the personification of scientific baseball. He is one of the few men in baseball who is credited with being a scientific hitter and able to place a hit. Many times he has been a league batting leader, a fast man on the bases and a sure felder. A teammate of McGraw and Jennings, he is about the last of that famous old Baltimore bunch to stick to the active game. With Keeler gone the national game would suffer a distinct loss.
