

LOCALS DROP FIRST TO LIVINGSTON

VISITING PROFESSIONALS GO TEN INNINGS TO WIN FROM MISSOULA GIANTS.

The Livingston team of the Intermountain league celebrated the near-expanding of that organization last evening by defeating the Missoula Giants on the south side grounds. Six to three was the score, but that doesn't tell the story. The fast amateurs who uphold local baseball honor made the visiting professionals go ten innings to win, reeling off the rounds in a style that took both teams almost out of their league class. The Livingston team played about 75 per cent better than it knew—at least, that's the way it looks when one remembers their record in the Intermountain. The league remnants went through the encounter of last evening without a bobble and touched Chevalier for 11 hits, although 12 of them fell for his slants. The first of the four games scheduled with the Livingston team attracted a good crowd, and tonight's audience should be even larger.

The Painful Tenth.

The tenth inning dawned bright and fair, with honors even, three to three. Dudley, the visitors' first champion, slammed one against Chevalier's hip and made first while the ball was careening around the infield. McIntosh bunted, sending Dudley to third, as the sack was left uncovered when Hudson went in after the catcher's put and nobody remembered, and so writer. Ralston cracked a single past third and Dudley scored. Wasson went out from Ball to Smith, but Marshall singled over second and Ralston crossed the plate. Petrie's bounder was fielded easily by Chevalier, but the notary on first let the toss slip and Marshall registered. That was all but that was also plenty. The locals failed to come back in their section of the added act. Chevalier, Kelley, who had replaced Stinger, and Dressen going out on infield errors.

The Early Innings.

The first three innings were clipped off without a tally, but in the first of the fourth Livingston scored once. With McIntosh put away for the round, Ralston lammed one to center for two bases and Wasson brought him in with a timely single. The visitors were held and the local talent pulled down two tallies in their half. Dressen was walked and Hudson swatted the fat boy around to third with a single to right field. Anderson placed one in the left garden and Dressen scored. Anderson going out at second and Hudson being arrested at third. Hudson scored when Marx bounced a fast one to second. Whiteman doubled to left, only to die when Ball fanned.

Livingston Ties.

Livingston tied the count in the sixth, McIntosh landing the score. With one out the Livingston backstop singled to left field and Ralston mashed one through third. Wasson hit to right for two bases and McIntosh scored, Ralston being caught between third and home. This left the books balanced at two and two and that's the way things stood until the ninth. In that round, with two gone, Doyle swung on a fast ball and assisted it over the right field fence and there was nothing to interfere with his peace of mind as he trotted around.

Missoula Ties.

The stand was just beginning to notice how cold it was getting when the Giants marched out for their last ditch stand, with the score board showing two to three against them. Hudson singled to center and was called safe at third, after Anderson had laid down a bunt. Marx hit to Dudley and the stopper had the ball back in plenty of time to nab Hudson. McIntosh, however, dropped the throw and Hudson was safe and the score was a tie once more. Hudson was hurt in the collision and his thigh went off duty for a moment. He came back, however, for the fateful tenth. There were no more scores in the ninth, Marx being caught at the plate when Ball duplicated the catcher's stroke to Dudley, after Whiteman had landed his second hit.

STATE BALL CIRCUIT BREAKS UP

FAILURE OF MISSOULA TO TAKE FRANCHISE SPLITS INTERMOUNTAIN.

Bozeman, July 20.—According to reports given out here today the Intermountain Baseball league is practically dissolved. The former Butte team has disbanded and Joe Marshall, Petrie and Lodell have signed with the Livingston team. The other players are still in Bozeman. The Butte team expected to go to Missoula to open a series of games today with the Giants. The team waited until late last night, but no transportation came, and then it was learned that the money had been sent to Livingston and the team of that city would play Missoula.

Missoula still has the privilege of taking the Butte franchise, but if not taken before tomorrow it is likely the league will be declared at an end at a meeting of the directors to be held in Helena. The Bozeman team goes to Helena tomorrow morning to open a series of three games there. Manager Farnsworth of the Bozeman team stated today that if the league were dissolved, the different teams would hold together and play independent ball the rest of the season.

All prospect of getting the local ball men to take the deserted franchise has gone now and there is no doubt that if the league is depending upon the Garden city fans to round out the circuit the disbandment is certain. Speaking last night one of the officers of the Missoula association said, "Missoula will not take the Butte franchise that is a cliché and if the league is to disband if Missoula fails to come through why it will have to break up that is all."
