Monday night Mayor Logan, for reasons which were certainly sufficient, revoked two retail liquor licenses and the city council indulged his action.

There was not a vote against the revocation. Since Monday there has been a general expression of approval from the business men of the city and from others who are concerned in having Missoula a clean town.

Yesterday morning a request was made of the mayor that he call a special meeting for the consideration of a proposition to bring up this question again.

For its own part, The Missoulian has this to say: Last Monday morning we went squarely on record as favoring the revocation of these licenses.

MAKE GOOD PROGRESS BOURGEOIS MAY BE ON TARIFF NAMED

MANY PARAGRAPHS SETTLED BELIEVED THAT FORMER MINISTER OF FINANCE WILL SUCCEED CLEMENCEAU.

Washington, July 21.—Better progress was made today by the tariff conference than on any day since the troublesome disputes were reached. Many paragraphs were settled without any renewal of hostilities.

Paris, July 21.—The work of forming a new ministry, to take the place of the Clemenceau regime, which came to a sudden end last night, was begun early today.

The entire nine schedules were adjusted. Sugar was made dutiable at 1 3/8 cents per pound, which is a reduction from the senate rate of 1 1/2 cents and an increase from the house rate of 1 cent.

The senate and house rates on lead ore were identical, the duty being 1 1/2 cents a pound. The house made pig lead dutiable at the same rate and the senate provided specifically for lead dress, lead bullion and pig lead at 2 1/8 cents a pound.

Senator Borah tried to effect an agreement by which hides may be put on the free list. He said the plan he had to suggest had been originated by President Taft.


