

# LIVINGSTON SWAMPS LOCAL STARS

## MISSOULA GIANTS GET HOT END OF 8 TO 2 SCORE IN LAST OF SERIES.

The Livingston team took kindly to the delivery of Pitcher Loehner and last evening saw the only inglorious defeat of the Missoula Giants at the hands of the visitors in their four-day battle on the south side grounds. Eight to two was the score, the visitors pounding out five hits in the fourth, which, coupled with wild heaves and costly boots, brought home six runs. Outside of this inning the game wasn't so bad, but the result was a nightmare. On account of the illness of Anderson, Main subbed at short. Kelley was used in center and Dressen in right.

### How It Happened.

Missoula was at the right end of a 1 to 0 score when the fourth opened. Marshall started the trouble with a single past third and Petrie skied to left. Fink singled past third, and Gordon lined one to center. Lodehl was safe on Main's bad peg and Dudley doubled to center. McIntosh hit over second for one sack and Ralston beat Ball's slow throw to first. This combination, aided by Hudson's hitting McIntosh in the back of the noodle as the backstop was tearing for the plate—after being caught asleep off third—netted six tallies. Wasson went out by the short-to-first route and Marshall, up for the second time in the inning, flew to center field.

The professionals scored their other two in the next round. Petrie clouted one to center and Fink's hunt was thrown away by Hudson, Petrie scoring. Gordon was pegged out by Loehner and Lodehl hit to Main, who booted the ball long enough to allow Fink to register. Lodehl was caught stealing and Dudley flew to Dressen.

### Missoula's Two.

Missoula scored in the second and seventh, a single tally each time. In the second Ball got on by Marshall's error, but was caught at second when Marx tried to sacrifice. Kelley gave Fink a chance to make a circus catch, but Main singled over second, advancing Marx to second. The catcher stole and came on home when Marshall lost McIntosh's peg in the setting sun.

In the seventh the other count came. Ball sided to Fink and Marx landed a Texas leaguer over third. Kelley played a billiard from Gordon to Dudley and Marx was tagged. Main singled to center and Kelley advanced to third, to score when McIntosh passed one, with Dressen at bat. The right fielder drew transportation, but Loehner flew to left.

### Trainer Goes In.

There wasn't much else to the game, barring a few pretty catches, excepting that Trainer went in for his maiden workout for the season in the eighth. He held the hostile safe and showed considerable form.

# BUTTE'S FRANCHISE AGAIN OFFERED

## HELENA MAGNATE URGES MISSOULA TO JOIN INTERMOUNTAIN LEAGUE.

To urge Missoula to accept the Butte franchise in the Intermountain league was the mission that brought Ray Church, a director of the Helena team and one of the leading spirits in the four-team organization that is now fighting for a right to live the season out, to Missoula yesterday. Last evening Mr. Church held a long conference with the directors of the Missoula association and while no definite promises were made by the local magnates, there is just a chance that the Garden city may see organized ball this season. The situation was discussed from every angle last night and today an attempt will be made to determine the city's willingness to support a professional team.

It is probable, according to the statement given out last night at the close of the conference, that some definite action will be taken today. It is known that there are many in Missoula who would like to see the city enjoy the prestige of being a member of the Intermountain, but, on the other hand, there are certain conditions that must be met first.

With Missoula replacing Butte, the new league would be composed of Helena, Bowman, Livingston and the Hell Gate metropolis. This circuit is thought to be as compact as can be secured in this state of "magnificent distances."
