# LOGAN IS INDORSED SPECULATIVE CHANCE BY CLERGY IS HERE

MINISTERS ADOPT RESOLUTIONS CAR LINE ADDITION PRESENTS A FINE OPPORTUNITY FOR SAFE INVESTMENT.

At a meeting of the Missoula Ministerial association yesterday afternoon action was taken regarding two matters of public interest as follows:  
Resolved that this association heartily commends Mayor Logan for his timely and vigorous action in revoking the licenses of the Headquarters and Board of Trade saloons, and the city council for its concurrence in his action. We believe the mayor's action to be wholly justified by the facts in the case, and we pledge him our moral support and that of our churches in maintaining the highest standard for law enforcement.  
We also heartily commend The Missoulian and the Herald for their outspoken support of Mayor Logan.

**Sunday Observance.**  
Resolved that we deplore the widespread tendency toward disregard of the Christian Sunday, and that we make public and vigorous protest against such use of that day as has recently been announced by certain business men of our city who are advertising a big sale of lots and an excursion to reach the place of the sale on the coming Sunday.  
We wish to suggest to all who make such use of the Lord's day that there are six days and six long evenings in every week in which it is suitable in industry to all concerned, but that Sunday should be a day of rest. This need of rest is stamped upon all men by their maker. Body and mind need periodic rest, even though men do not care to worship, and to transact business or to do work not absolutely necessary on Sunday is an injustice to all concerned.  
To make use of Sunday for business purposes is subversive of the highest interests of the city. If one should come to town and embark in some wild scheme which would be injurious to legitimate business, these very men would be among the first to enter vigorous protest; yet the use of Sunday which they are making for selfish business purposes is injurious to Missoula's highest interests and in the name of the interests we protest, and urge that business be confined to the other six days of the week.

Further, we earnestly urge upon public attention that the city's best growth and advancement must be based upon the development of its moral and religious, as well as its material interests. No man can be a true municipal patriot—booster, if you choose—who ignores the higher interests of his city. Therefore we urge upon all business men the confinement of business matters to the six business days of the week.
