HUNDREDS OF TREES ARE DESTROYED

GOVERNMENT MAKES EFFORTS TO CHECK RAVAGES OF BEETLES ON FORESTS.

There are emergencies in which the government must depart from the usual policy of conserving the timber, and disposing of it by well regulated sales. It is sometimes necessary to destroy bodies of timber of considerable extent or at least to cut the trees and leave the logs lying in the woods, where they may, or may not, become useful before decay sets in. Such apparent wastefulness is made necessary most frequently by attacks of the Black Hills beetle upon the western yellow or Rocky mountain pine. The destruction of beetle-infested trees is in reality no more wasteful than would be the destructive action necessary to stamp out an infectious disease among cattle, horses or sheep. Trees which have been attacked by the Black Hills pine beetle are harboring the dangerous pest for almost a year after the attack is made. After that period the beetles having left them, they are no more a menace than are the bleached bones of a steer scattered upon the prairie.

The Black Hills beetle has long since passed beyond the confines of the region which gives it a name. Last winter the insect was discovered in increasing numbers upon the San Isabel national forest in southern Colorado. As the result of the 1908 depredations nearly 600 yellow pine trees, practically in a solid body, were dying. The timber was not damaged for commercial purposes, but the local market was not such as to induce any one to handle the proposition of cutting the trees for lumber. The trees contained larvae of the beetle, which, if all matured, would have been sufficiently numerous to have successfully attacked several thousand trees during the summer of 1909. Immediate action was necessary to destroy the larvae, before the warmth of spring drove them from their burrows beneath the bark. A force of men was employed to work under the direction of a forest ranger, and the greater part of the trees were cut, before the snow left the ground. The bark was peeled from the trunks for an average distance of 25 feet per tree, exposing the tender larvae to the cold and drying influence of the air. The peeled logs were then sawed for mine props, to be disposed of later, if possible. The actual value of these logs is slight in comparison with the value of the timber which might have been killed in future years had the drastic action not been taken. There is every reason to believe that the infestation will cease to exist, and that, in addition, the expense to the government will be repaid in the sale of the "sterilized" logs.

RHODES EXAMINATION TO BE HELD IN FALL

President C. A. Dunway of the University of Montana has just been notified by the secretary of the Rhodes scholarship trust that the next qualifying examination for the Rhodes scholars will be held October 19 and 20. The committee of selection for Montana, of which President Dunway is chairman, has not yet designated the place for the holding of the examination in this state, but this announcement will be made later. The examination questions are prepared in England by the Rhodes Scholarship trust, all the necessary blanks being forwarded in sealed packages to the chairman of the committee, to be opened at a certain hour on the date of the examination. There will be little variation in the character of the examination this year from that of previous years, the principal part and the most difficult one for American students being the Latin and Greek examination. Two students of the University of Montana have previously received the scholarship, which pays \$1,500 a year for the three years of the scholar's attendance at Oxford. One of these, George A. Barnes, graduated from Oxford two years ago, and the other, James Thomas, has one year more before he receives his degree from the English institution. Mr. Thomas is spending the summer in Missoula. Those who are interested in Rhodes scholarships may obtain full information concerning the examination from President Dunway of the university.

J. D. THOMAS' FUNERAL IS LARGELY ATTENDED

A very largely attended funeral was that of J. D. Thomas, the Northern Pacific brakeman who was killed last week in a wreck near Durant. The services were held at the Lucy chapel yesterday morning, the sermon being delivered by Rev. J. W. Tait of the Methodist Episcopal church. The floral offerings were many, there being a number of set pieces. The members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engine-men attended in a body and followed the remains to their last resting place in the Missoula cemetery.


