RESERVATION MAN IS WARNED RECEIVES LETTER FROM MINISTER TO SPAIN REGARDING SWINDLING BAND.

The latest story regarding the operations of the notorious gang of Spanish swindlers, that band which is so well known because of its operations in this country, comes from a man residing at St. Ignace, on the reservation. Nearly a year ago this man, Andrew Magee, received letters from the men in Spain, stating that he, by an old will, was heir to a large estate in that country and that the correspondents would, providing the necessary funds were advanced, see that he got his inheritance. There was also a beautiful Spanish girl supposed to be mixed up in the case and, by the terms of the will, she was to be brought to this country by the heir. The story sounded plausible and read all right, but Mr. Magee was skeptical. Some time later he happened to read in The Missoulian a story exposing these swindlers and holding them up to the public notice. Then, to see how far the men would go, Mr. Magee corresponded with them and received copies of the will and other papers. He also received a number of various papers in the case. Finally, as a last step in the game, Mr. Magee wrote to the American minister in Spain, Henry C. Ide, regarding the status of the band and yesterday received a reply from the minister, stating, in plain terms, that the whole thing was a swindle. Mr. Magee considers himself very lucky, as he did not spend any money on the proposition. In fact he thinks he is ahead of the game, as he has a picture of the signorina. He says he has a number of various papers purporting to relate to the will and its bequests. The American minister, Mr. Ide, requests Mr. Magee to publish the letter and thus aid in the work of exposing the criminals. The letter is as follows:

American Legation, Madrid, June 15, 1933. Andy Magee, St. Ignace, Missoula Co., Montana. Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of recent date, in regard to an estate in Spain which you have been told has been left by a relative of yours, I beg to inform you that the whole matter is a swindle and an attempt to obtain money from you by false pretences. There are on file at this legation hundreds of communications received from people in the United States to whom letters similar to the one you received have been sent. There has been in existence in this country for upwards of thirty years an apparently well organized band of swindlers, who work upon the same lines that have been used in the attempt to deceive you. You may be sure that there is no truth whatever in the statements made to you by the people on this side in this connection. If you were to continue the correspondence with these swindlers they would send you copies of court decrees, testaments, wills, etc., all tending to support their statements, but I warn you they are forgeries. Recently within one week one man in Iowa and another in New Hampshire have each sent \$500 here to pay the expenses of the reputed daughter to America. Two other men have arrived in Madrid, having journeyed all the way from Montana, for the purpose of taking the same child to their home; and a priest in Columbus, Ohio, has informed me that members of his parish had started to mortgage their farms in order to raise money to send to these swindlers. In the past few months, victims from nearly every state in the Union have written to this legation.

As you have been proved financially lost by the information here sent you, I ask you, in return, to help save others from being swindled and to lighten my labor in the matter (my correspondence in connection with it being burdensome) by immediately giving to the newspapers of your locality, an account of this swindle, so that publicity may kill it. Efforts are being made to bring the parties to justice here, but the only effective remedy is a public and complete exposure of the absolutely false and fraudulent character of the entire scheme. LIVINGSTON RESIDENT DIES AT N. P. HOSPITAL

E. A. Campbell, aged about 33 years, died at 8 o'clock last evening at the Northern Pacific hospital. He was brought to the infirmary last Thursday and his condition was at once seen to be serious, and an operation was performed, but his affection, gangrenous appendicitis, developed complications and became too serious to be checked, and he sank rapidly to his death, in spite of all that could be done for him. His wife and a brother, W. J. Campbell, were at the bedside at the end. The deceased and his wife were residents of Livingston, where he was a conductor on the Northern Pacific. Besides the widow and brother he leaves a small child. No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral.
