DRUNKENNESS IS PLEA TO BE MADE

DEFENSE IN RYAN CASE WILL
OFFER INTOXICATION AS
EXCUSE FOR CRIME.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 26.—That the killing of Harry E. Snyder and Otto Miller and the wounding of Miguel Lopez, by Albert Ryan, organizing secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, in the United States hotel July 16, will be charged to liquor, was indicated at the examination of Ryan on a charge of murder before Justice Frederickson today.

Alfred W. Morrison, who has been retained by the mining organization in behalf of Ryan, had particular stress on the question as to whether his client was drinking that night or the day before in cross-examining the witness.

The charge upon which Ryan is being given a hearing today is for murdering Snyder. He will be examined later for the murder of Miller.

Ryan, a gaunt, raw-boned miner, with sharp, shifting eyes regarded the proceedings seemingly with only a casual interest.

MORE INDICTMENTS.

Chicago, July 26.—The case of Police Inspector McCann, who was indicted by the grand jury last Saturday, charged with bribery and malfeasance

in office, was today set for hearing tomorrow before Judge McSurely in the criminal court. Additional indictments containing charges against 13 keepers of disorderly establishments were returned by the grand jury today.

FAMOUS COAL CASE PRACTICALLY ENDED

Salt Lake, Utah, July 26.—The prosecution of the Utah Fuel company by the federal government, on the charge of having illegally acquired certain coal lands in Carbon county by using "dummies," was practically ended today by the dismissal of two suits and the payment to the government of \$73,000 for the payment for coal extracted from the lands. The Utah Fuel company further agreed to convey to the United States 830 acres of land in Carbon county and other counties in the state valued at \$75,000. The total amount paid the government by the Utah Fuel company for the past four months reaches the sum

of \$275,000. In addition the government has recovered coal lands valued at \$200,000.

TOWN WIPED OUT.

Winnipeg, Man., July 26.—The town of Mecklin, located in Saskatchewan, was wiped out by a tornado yesterday. No one was badly injured.

COLORED TROOPERS REACH SAN FRANCISCO

New York, July 26.—Back from two year's service in the Philippines and led by Major General Lerard, who commanded the department of the east, the colored troopers of the fighting Tenth, the cavalry regiment which won a record for bravery in the historic charge up San Juan hill today marched up Broadway from the transport Klipatrick to the Ninth Regiment armory. Crowds lined the curbs and cheered the dusky regulars. Tomorrow the regiment will proceed to its new station at Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont.

AIRSHIP COMPANY FORMED.

Columbus, O., July 26.—The first airship company formed in Ohio was chartered by the secretary of state today. The company, a Cleveland concern, is authorized to manufacture and sell airships and aeroplanes and to transport passengers and freight through space.

ONE GIRL'S REMAINS RESCUED FROM RIVER

Helena, July 26.—A special to the Record from Billings says that despite the earnest efforts made last night and today the body of only one of the four victims of yesterday's Yellowstone river accident, wherein four persons were drowned, has been recovered—that of Theresa West, aged 16. It has also been learned that the name of the fourth victim is Minnie, the 6-year-old daughter of Alderman John C. Staffick. Miss Vaggoner, another of the victims, was a recent arrival in Billings from New Salem, N. D.

Mexico City, July 26.—Political riots terrorized the entire city of Guadalajara, capital of the state of Jalisco, yesterday and last night, when street fighting broke out between the soldiers and police and the adherents of General Reyes. Many persons were wounded, including an American whose name is not known. The American consul has appealed for aid. Many buildings were wrecked.

FOUR ARE INJURED.

Lima, Peru, July 26.—Four persons were injured today in a conflict at the Callao station between the police and 200 striking engineers, firemen and conductors.

Butte, July 26.—The Revs. Nott, singer, Williams and Groeneveld were named as a "Lexow committee" today by the Butte Ministerial association, which initiated at its meeting last Monday a crusade against prizefights. The preachers called upon the sheriff and county attorney and demanded that the Tippets-Capone fight, scheduled for Wednesday night, be stopped. The ministers announce that they will also probe gambling and the social poison penitentiary.
