# PERMANENT HOME HAMILTON IS READY TO BE CHOSEN FOR DEER LODGE

HAMILTON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO DECIDE ON ITS BUILDING.

Hamilton, July 26.—The Hamilton Chamber of Commerce will hold its second meeting here Wednesday night for the purpose of talking over the different propositions for a location for the office. This question has become an important one and the members of the chamber wish to decide it as early as possible and get settled. Secretary Irwin made a move during the last week toward securing a lease from the Northern Pacific on some of the depot grounds for a building and it looks as if this site would be the one chosen. The sentiment of the members seems to be all this way and if the desired lease can be gotten there is no doubt but that the building will be put up there at once. The home of the chamber of commerce, if it is placed here, will be unexcelled by any in Montana. Visitors will be greeted right at the depot, a permanent exhibit will be maintained and the grounds around the building and around the depot will be parked and kept in fine condition.

## SHOWERS REFRESH VALLEY FARM LANDS

Hamilton, July 26.—Hamilton and the Bitter Root valley got another of the much needed and highly valued rains today and the thunder-storm which prevailed most of the afternoon has left the whole valley fresh and brightened up. Speaking of the way in which the rains help the crops, a prominent Hamilton business man and rancher said yesterday: "The people outside of the valley think that we are exaggerating when we call a good rain like this a 'million-dollar rain' but we are not. The value of these showers to the farmers of this part of the state can not be over estimated and I feel entirely safe when I say that today's shower was worth a good \$100,000 to the valley."
