CLEARWATER BEGINS CONDEMNATION SUIT

Yesterday the Clearwater Short Line Railway company started condemnation proceedings in the district court against R. W. Angevine, the land involved being in the Lolo country.

Yesterday the commissioners in two of the many condemnation suits of 149 new road made their reports. The award in the case of Lizzie Woods et al was \$5,606.33 and in the case of Thomas E. Magee et al, \$1,441.

Charles Ferguson and A. L. Beardsley filed complaint in the district court yesterday against R. W. Peters. The plaintiffs in this action allege that the defendant empowered them to see a piece of real estate for them, promising a commission if they found a buyer. When a prospective purchaser was produced, the complaint recites, the defendant refused to make out a deed and the sale was off. The suit is intended to recover \$1,650, covering the lost commission and the time and effort spent in locating a man desirous of buying the defendant's property.

BIG SUM IS OFFERED FOR BUFFALO

SALTESE MINE ATTRACTS THE ATTENTION OF EXPERIENCED EXPERTS, WHO BID HIGH.

Twenty-five of the stockholders of the Buffalo Mining company, representing practically all of the shares, were present Tuesday night at the annual meeting of the company, held in the Missoula hotel. The meeting was unusually interesting and did not adjourn until an early hour yesterday morning. In addition to the election of officers, the shareholders had to consider a proposition for the purchase of the entire stock of the company on a controlling interest on a basis of 20 cents a share, the offer representing \$200,000 if it is accepted.

This offer was made in writing to the shareholders by H. E. Samuels of the Success and the Monitor mines and is regarded as the best possible evidence there could be of the worth of the properties held by the Buffalo company, numbering 28 surveyed claims, and lying two and a half miles east of the Monitor. There has been considerable development work done on the properties; the main tunnel is 1,100 feet deep and there are two other tunnels, of 700 and 300 feet, respectively, together with three shafts, all of which are in good use. The 1,000-foot tunnel has cut four ledges and there are known to be two others ahead that have not been reached.

When the Samuels interests acquired the Monitor, it was at a figure considerably below that named in the offer for the Buffalo stock and there was a good equipment of machinery on the property that went with the deal. This makes the offer for the Buffalo, which is on the Monitor ledge, all the more impressive to those who have watched the progress of the development. It signifies that the careful surveys and examination of the Buffalo which have been recently made by Expert Merriam of Wallace have convinced the examiner of the worth of the mine.

No final action was taken at the meeting regarding the proposition. It came up after the regular meeting had adjourned and the stockholders present named P. J. Conroy, Paul Gerber and Morton Webster as a committee to inquire into the offer and to make a formal report to be presented to the stockholders. This committee will perform its duties at once and the meeting to act upon the report will be called in a short time.

The officers of the company, elected at the regular meeting, are: President, P. J. Conroy; vice president, Morton Webster; secretary, Sam Linn; treasurer, Paul Gerber; assistant secretary, W. Sponcer of Wallace. The directors of the company, chosen at the time, are: P. J. Conroy, Morton Webster, Ole Linn, Sam Linn, Mike Linn, George W. Craddock, Adam Garman, George Dunham and Paul Gerber.
