## NEWS IS RECEIVED OF DEATH

FRED NASH, SON OF MR. AND MRS. NASH OF MISSOULA, DIES IN NEW MEXICO.

Sorrow was brought to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Nash of this city when a telegram was received announcing the death at Clayton, N. M., Wednesday morning of their son, Fred Nash. Members of the family here had no intimation that the young man was ill until the message came announcing his death, and the news was a crushing blow to them. Mr. and Mrs. Nash are now on their way to the New Mexico town.

The telegram contained no details and nothing has been heard here regarding the cause of the young man's death. It is known, however, that he suffered an attack of typhoid fever some time ago, and it is presumed that a relapse proved fatal.

Only a short time ago young Mr. Nash notified his parents of his intention to bring his wife to Missoula on a visit to them and his sisters, and a message was expected from him at any time announcing the definite date of their coming. Not having seen him for some time, the family was looking anxiously for this message when another came bringing the sad news of his death. It found all the members of the family except Miss Cora Nash out of the city. Mrs. Nash and Miss Marie having left Sunday for Hunter's Hot Springs, where Miss Nash is seeking relief from a severe attack of inflammatory rheumatism. Mr. Nash, who was at Drummond, was summoned immediately, and yesterday morning he and Miss Cora left to meet Mrs. Nash at Livingston. The father and mother will go on to Clayton, N. M., while Miss Cora will join her sister at the springs.

Young Mr. Nash had been living at Amarilla, Texas, but recently moved to Clayton, N. M. He was in the prime of young manhood when death overtook him and brought to an untimely close a bright and promising life. The family has many friends who extend their sincerest sympathy to them in their bereavement.


