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HELENA MAKES IT FIVE STRAIGHT BY LANDING TWO SUNDAY CONTESTS

Professionals Win Twice on Sabbath from Missoula Giants by Scores of 5 to 2 and 4 to 2—Bozeman Comes Tomorrow for Rest of the Coming Week.

The Helena baseball team went home last night with the satisfaction of having taken every game in the series with Missoula. They took in yesterday's contests easily, winning the first by a score of 5 to 2 and the second by 4 to 2. The first game was rather ragged and was a repetition of the rest of the series, but the final contest, which was played in the evening, gave more satisfaction to the small crowd which saw it, for it was clean and well played throughout.

The First Game.
As in the opening game of the series, Southpaw Johnson was the stumbling block in the path of the Giants, and the local exponents, even with the added strength of two crack men from the Butte Reduction works, were forced to content themselves with the short end of a 5 to 2 score in the afternoon game yesterday. Helena hit Butler hard, but in only three innings were the bingles clustered. Even at that, had two long drives to center not been misjudged by Freeman, another stranger, and had his support been a little less wobbly at critical periods, the tall finger should have had a better break. Cahill, the very first man up, started the run getting for the visitors by rapping one straight on a line to dead center and made third easily when Freeman watched the ball go over his head. Stis was an easy out, Butler to Welty, but Morse singled to right, taking third on Durig's fumble, while Cahill tallied. Elsey grounded to short and when Anderson juggled the ball momentarily Morse counted. Harmuth hit to right for one base and Elsey was caught at the plate.

The Giants tied it up in their half of the first after two were out. Anderson put one squarely over the third bag, but was caught at stop at first. Welty died, Johnson to Elsey, Schills, the fat boy, got a dig in the ribs and came all the way around when Marx clouted a screamer to the center fence. Thomas and Schills collided at the plate and before the crippled catcher could recover his equilibrium Marx drove in. For the remaining eight innings Johnson was tight as a drum.

Helena added two more to its string in the fifth on a double and two singles in a bunch and still another in the seventh on two one-base hits and a sacrifice.

It looked as though Missoula had a chance to tie in the ninth, but hope was short lived. Johnson walked, Smith and Hill in rapid succession, but Butler hit into a double play and Durig struck out.

While Stis made four corking hits in five times at bat. Welty would be a fixture at first if he could get a job teaching school around these diggings.

Besides a round of applause, Anderson got two fingers on his right hand split when he made a brilliant catch of Harmuth's short fly back of second in the ninth.

This same midget shortstop may be excused for most of his boos around the second bag. He tries for everything and generally redeems himself.

Morse's glove-hand stah of Marx's liner over second was rather miffy.

In both the third and the seventh Johnson struck out the first two men up. Johnson and Harmuth as a team got away with the Alfons and Gaston

stunt twice on popup flies to the infield.

The Evening Game.
And likewise the evening game. The visitors put the last game on their side of the tally board last night by a score of 4 to 2, although it was after the best game of the lot, and one in which neither team was able to call itself safe until after the last man was out.

Ames, who was in the box for Helena, was a complete mystery to the locals. Time and again he saved himself by his classy twirling, striking out 14 men during the game. At the end of the second inning he had taken in five out of six men up and not until the fourth did any of the home pride see the first sack.

Helena landed one in the first. Cahill, the first man to face Main, was presented with a base and he scored on clever base running and short infield hits, although each of the three men following were put out without getting past first.

In the second both teams were retired easily, but in the third session Helena again sent a man over the plate on a bad throw by Anderson to first.

In the fourth, however, Ames, who had been such a puzzle to the locals, fell down a little, and every man up came in for a good, hard swat. Anderson started the procession with a liner through short and he immediately advanced to third by Welty's hit to the same hole, Morse fumbling the ball until Andy was safe. Schills took advantage of the opportunity and on another error by Morse sent Anderson over the plate, although he was himself caught at first. Marx kicked in with a hot two-bagger, but was caught trying to steal, and Schills stuck to third. Smith hit to third and Welty scored, the side retiring when Smith was caught off his base and Ball put out stealing second.

Helena's Score.
This ended the scoring for Missoula, but Helena chalked up again in the fifth on a two-base hit by Johnson and a long fly by Stis, and in the ninth on a passed ball by Freeman.

The game, which was clean and hard-fought throughout, ended in a disgraceful row after the third out in the ninth. Marx and Harmuth, who held down the third corner for Helena, came to blows, and their encounter was ended only by interference on the part of the other players.
