MERCANTILE TEAMS TO CLASH TOMORROW

What the advance notice issued by the teams describes as a "highly interesting and exciting game of baseball" will be played tomorrow evening in the city park, where the west side of the Missoula Mercantile company's store meets the east side on the diamond. Preparations have been going on for the contest for some time and the rivalry is keen. Under the management of Captain Pugsley the east side team, which comprises the players from the grocery, hardware and implement departments, has been hard at work getting into shape for the big game while the other team, captained by Lundstrom of the shoe department, has become, at least, 90 members claim, the fastest aggregation in the city. BIDS FOR SIDEWALKS ARE OPENED BY CLERK

Judge J. M. Evans as clerk for the school board yesterday afternoon opened the bids for the cement sidewalks around the county high school building. Some time ago the board awarded the contract for the work without competition to the Mirac-Trip Concrete company of Helena at a bid of 18 1/2 cents per lineal foot. A protest followed, however, from the local contractors with the result that the bids were called for. These were opened yesterday and were as follows: Heaton & Johnson of Missoula, 15 cents; H. L. Hayes of Missoula, 17 cents; Mirac-Trip company of Helena, 18 cents; Ingstrom & Co. of Missoula, 16 cents; J. E. Wilson of Missoula, 17 1/2 cents; M. Germaine of Missoula, 15 cents; and Zesmer & Bradley of Missoula 15 cents. These bids will be taken before the board for consideration at their next meeting, when the contract will be awarded.

HAS FORMIDABLE FORCE.

Melilla, Aug. 10.—General Marina, the Spanish commander in Morocco, now has a total of 26,000 soldiers at his disposal and is completing his preparations for a concerted movement against Mount Guruga, the center of the Moorish positions. The Spaniards have been bombarding Mount Guruga daily.

FIRST SAENGERFEST LOOKS GOOD

DIRECTOR WITZMAN ANNOUNCES THAT STATE MEETING WILL BE IMPORTANT.

An important meeting of the Missoula Maennerchor will be held on next Sunday evening. At that time final arrangements will be made for the first state saengerfest, which is to be held in this city on September 12 and 14. At the Sunday evening meeting committees for the reception and entertainment of the visitors, of whom hundreds are expected, will be appointed.

Director J. K. Witzman, who is at the head of the local maennerchor, is now making up the program for the concert to be given at the Harmon theater as a feature of the fest. Mr. Witzman announces that this concert is to be an elaborate affair and that the fest itself will be attended by a mixed chorus of 60 voices from Helena, and that Butte and Anaconda will be well represented. The famous Adami quartet and a quartet of local talent will help to make the first state saengerfest a success. The director has a splendid local organization and promises that the Missoula singers will hold their own in the state meeting.

FOREST FIRES RAGE NEAR WALLACE, IDAHO

Wallace, Aug. 26.—Forest fires are raging today on all sides of this city and the blazes, which are rapidly becoming serious, have already gotten beyond the control of the rangers. A telegram received today by Forest Supervisor Weigle states that the engines on the Puget Sound have scattered fire along the line of that road from St. Joe to Grand Forks and that the small band of rangers now on the scene are powerless to check the advance of the flames. Aid from headquarters is asked for.
The state game warden is at present fighting a serious fire near Medford, a point just outside of the Coeur d'Alene forest which is rapidly advancing toward the reserve.
A fire was started today near Wallace on the right-of-way of the Northern Pacific and the local force of forestry men was called out today to check this.

A ranger on the local forest reported today that two big fires had been lit on the Indian reservation near Palouse but no action was taken regarding it as that country is outside of the jurisdiction of the local officials.
