AUTHORITIES TRACE CLEVER FORGER

MISSOULA COUNTY OFFICERS WILL EXTRADITE C. R. A. KLINE, WANTED HERE.

The sheriff's office has traced C. R. A. Kline to Calgary, in Alberta, Can., and will now make an attempt to secure extradition papers from the Dominion government. Kline is badly wanted in Missoula and Spokane for manipulating checks and passing worthless paper, and the local authorities have been working on the case for several weeks. Kline, who passed himself for a wealthy resident of an eastern town, got away with a number of bad checks in Missoula, and continued his operations in Spokane. Under Sheriff Miller returned yesterday from Spokane, where he succeeded in determining that Kline had gone to Canada and in having him arrested and returned without being extradited, and the necessary steps are now being taken.

Created Balance.

In Spokane Kline showed a bank book with a \$5,000 balance in the First National of Missoula, and on the strength of this cashed several large checks. According to the sheriff's office Kline deposited \$50 in the local bank and raised the figures to \$5,000. He is known to have imposed his worthless paper on several business men of Missoula.

Boy Is Arrested.

Arthur Murphy, a 16-year-old boy, was arrested yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Daniels, who took his prisoner from the enjoyment of a swim near the Maclay bridge. Murphy will face a rather serious charge, that of stealing a horse and wagon, if County Attorney Muloney doesn't decide to attempt to send the youth to the reform school. He took a wagon belonging to R. M. Duncan of Riverside addition and a horse belonging to Thomas Brown and started out on a fishing trip, after borrowing a set of harness from still another neighbor. On the return trip the wagon met with an accident and the journey was finished on foot, after the horse had been turned loose. Murphy is said to be incorrigible and has not been home for two weeks. He is now in the county jail.

TWO WIVES EXPRESS DESIRE FOR FREEDOM

Two divorce cases were filed in the district court yesterday, the wives being plaintiffs in both instances. Katherine Brown wishes to be divorced from Henry Brown and the complaint filed by her attorney gives a long recital of acts of cruelty. The couple was married on July 8, 1889, at Omaha and has five children, ranging in age from 22 to 15 years. Both are prominent residents of C. Y. The husband's attorney filed a demurrer to the complaint yesterday. Grace Connors is suing for a divorce from Rodney S. Connors, alleging desertion. Mr. and Mrs. Connors were married at Victor on June 20, 1904, and have one child, a 4-year-old daughter.
