FINE IS ASSESSED AGAINST DUNPHY MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

MAN CONVICTED OF GAMBLING MUST PAY TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS AND COSTS.

Yesterday in the district court a fine of \$200 and costs was assessed against Peter Dunphy, found guilty on a gambling charge several months ago. As will be remembered by those who have followed the case, Dunphy's attorney postponed his sentence by a motion in arrest of judgment. This has now been overruled and yesterday's action followed. Dunphy was not in court to receive sentence, his presence being waived by his lawyer. Execution is stayed until Thursday, August 19. Dunphy was arrested in a raid on a "joint" over a front street saloon, this being about the first excursion of this sort executed by Sheriff Graham and his officers. Mr. Graham arrested Dunphy and several other men, most of whom were held as witnesses, during the first week of this year, within a short time after he had taken office. County Attorney Mulrooney filed information against Dunphy on January 8.

Awards Are Made.

Yesterday the commissioners in two of the condemnation cases of the Clearwater Short Line Railway company filed their awards in the district court. The sum awarded in the case against Thomas E. Magee and Irene W. Magee is \$1,441, while Lizzie F. Woods and Edwin Woods are to receive \$5,896.64.

Divorces.

On the default of the defendant, Bessie Rabinovitz secured a divorce yesterday from Aaron Rabinovitz. Cruelty was the ground on which the marriage was set aside.

Two divorce cases were dismissed yesterday. Cathryn Brown withdrawing her charges against Henry Brown and Charles F. Copeland asking that his suit against Luellen be dismissed without prejudice. The Brown suit was filed last week.

New Lawyers.

Ronald Higgins, Daniel J. Heyfron and Gilbert Heyfron were admitted to practice in the local court yesterday on motion of Attorney Charles H. Hall. All three are graduates of the University of Michigan's law school and are of prominent Missoula families.

New York, Aug. 14.—After a brief show of hesitancy at the opening today, during which small fractional losses were general, the market turned front and rose in a frequent and buoyant manner until almost every stock of market influence was ruling between one and two points above yesterday's closing. The bulls were bravely surprised with the comparative steadiness of prices at the opening despite the heaviness of the London market and the weak close of yesterday. Except for a decline in the first few minutes of 3-8 in Union Pacific, the subsequent rise in the stock was almost continuous until it reached 218 1-2 or 3-4 beyond where it left off yesterday. Reactions which amounted to a point at times had only a moderate effect on the general market and seemed to serve as a new basis to start renewed manipulation. The preferred stock showed the effect of heavy realizing sales and ruled over two points below yesterday's closing at one period. Toward the end of the day professional operators who were reluctant to carry stocks over Sunday began to sell out, and although there was some recessions running to a point, notably in Union Pacific, the offerings were comparatively well taken and the bidding up process was being resumed in various quarters at the close, which was rather confused and irregular.

Bonds were steady. Total sales, (par value), \$3,046,000. United States 4s registered declined 1-2 on call during the week.

A BALLOON CORPS TO BE ORGANIZED

Boston, Aug. 14.—Massachusetts is to have the first "volunteer balloon corps" in the world, according to the announcement made today by Charles J. Glidden, the well known aeronaut and automobilist, who is now making plans for organizing the aeronautic corps this fall. Recognition from the state militia will be sought. The volunteer corps will consist of men of prominence who are interested in aeronautics and will be made up of two divisions, pilot and meteorological. The pilot division will include the leading balloonists now making ascensions in Massachusetts for pleasure. Those who have been invited to join the meteorological division are Professor W. Pickering and Professor A. Lawrence Roth of Harvard, Professor David Dood of Amherst and Professor Clayton, formerly of the Blue Hill observatory.






