## UNIVERSITY REGISTER IS ISSUED

STATE SCHOOL PUBLISHES COMPREHENSIVE STATEMENT OF WORK FOR THE YEAR.

The annual register of the state university has been issued this week. It is a comprehensive document, setting forth clearly the resources and the advantages of the institution which stands at the head of Montana's educational system. The register has been entirely rewritten, and in its new form is a clear exposition of the conditions at the state university; it is worth careful perusal.

A study of the register reveals two or three points which indicate emphatically the development which is taking place in the institution; this development goes on quietly, but it makes certain the fact that there is growing up in Montana an institution of the real university class. This fact is borne in upon the reader of the register as he considers the changes that have taken place in the comparatively few years of the life of the school.

First, the reader will observe that the preparatory department has at last been entirely eliminated. This is the natural result of the perfecting of the state's system of secondary education; the county and city high schools have removed the necessity which existed, years ago, for a preparatory department. The university takes its place this year as a school entirely of the collegiate class.

### Faculty Stronger.

Next, it will be apparent to even the most casual reader of the register that there has been a strengthening of the faculty, and that the extension and improvement of library and laboratory facilities and equipment has been marked during the past year. The completion and occupancy of the new library building has made possible a relief of the congestion which has existed in several of the departments; the creation of new professorships has relieved departments which were formerly crowded so much that their efficiency was hampered. The entire register breathes a spirit of strength and earnestness.

While all of the departments have been strengthened by the elimination of the preparatory section, there are specific instances in which there has been notable improvement along this line. The course in biology has been divided by the creation of a chair of forestry, which will continue the work well inaugurated by Professor Herrod, and will leave him free to amplify the work in biology. The appointment of a professor of physics will, likewise, lessen the duties of Dr. Rowe and will enable him to devote more time to his special work in geology. At the same time the development of courses in physics strengthens this department.

### Courses Revised.

There has been an interesting and beneficial extension and revision of the courses in engineering which is a great improvement, associated with this revision is the creation of a course in chemical engineering which will prove attractive to many students. The new courses in forestry will make the state university one of the noteworthy institutions of the country.

The completion of the new library building has made possible the extension of the university's museum and the arranging of much valuable material which has heretofore been in storage. It also enables the shelving of many books which have hitherto not been available on account of lack of room.

A department of library science has been established, in which the student will be given practical training in both the university library and in the Missoula city library. The department of education, which was discontinued for a year, has been re-established. The department of drawing has been affiliated into a department of fine arts. An announcement is made of a change in the system of management of Woman's hall. This is to be taken out of the contract plan, as affecting the dining room, and will be managed by the university, with Miss Brewer as matron. In the list of scholarships, announcement is made for the first time of the Keith scholarship, available to meritorious members of high school debating teams who are in need of financial assistance to complete their university work. A new sorority is announced, and there has been a complete revision of the athletic rules. All in all, the university register this year is a document that will prove interesting to all friends of the institution and highly instructive to all who are seeking information regarding the school.

### OFFERS CHERRY TREES.

## BIG GOLD VALUES SHOWN BY ASSAY

Helena, Aug. 18.—John Klein of the firm of Klein and Bourne, one of the local stockholders in the Strawberry Mining company, operating the mine of that name in the Marysville district, has had an assay made of a sample secured at the 150-foot level of that property, which shows the presence of yellow metal at the rate of \$1,800 a ton. The property is now being drained preparatory to actual mining operations, which it is expected will begin within four or five weeks. The mill is also to be enlarged from its present capacity of two stamps to that of ten.
