MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

New York, Aug. 20.—Today's stock market was very irregular. At the opening most of the declines were fractional, but before the end of the first hour the movement gathered great momentum under a fresh accumulation of selling orders and depressions of two points or more were recorded throughout the active list. The business of the morning session was estimated at 700,000 shares. Of the many theories offered to account for the market heaviness were two worthy of serious consideration. The first, of course, has to do with the apprehension existing in many quarters regarding the health of Mr. E. H. Harriman and the other that of "shaking out" of the rank and file was deemed advisable by those who are supposed in control of the market's machinery. In the afternoon the whole market rallied. It is noteworthy that the better known commission houses seem to have played only a passive part in the week's declines which may be accepted as an indication that out of town centers were but slightly interested in the course of events here.

Throughout the day considerable strength was shown by a group of specialties, which included United States Rubber, American Car & Foundry and American Locomotive. As an illustration of the market's extreme narrowness, dealings in four stocks, namely, Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, Reading and United States Steel—made up fully 50 per cent of the day's business which aggregated 1,450,000 shares. The closing was steady, with the rally still under way.

The bond market was again weak. Total sales, (par value), \$4,978,000. Government bonds were unchanged.

Local dealers quoted lake copper at \$12.12 1/2@12.37 1/2; electrolytic at \$12.87 1/2@13.12 1/2; and casting at \$12.62 1/2@12.87 1/2. Lead was steady with spot at \$4.35 64 1/2 New York and \$4.25@4.35 East St. Louis. The London market was a shade higher at 112 10s. Spelter closed steady with spot quoted at \$5.70@5.80 New York. The London market was unchanged at 122.

Grain and Provisions.

Chicago, Aug. 20.—Ideal weather for the harvesting of the crop of wheat in the northwest caused a severe slump in the wheat prices today, but much of the loss was regained on covering by shorts. Talk of some wheat having been sold for export induced considerable covering which resulted in a rally of about 1c in all deliveries. The market closed strong, with prices up 1/2@3/4 to 1 1/4c. Oats were extremely weak early but later became much steadier. Prices at the close were a shade lower to 1/2c higher. Provisions were inclined to be weak all day, and closed unchanged to 10c lower.

WASHES HIS HANDS OF ENTIRE MATTER

Washington, Aug. 20.—Until today the officials of the interior department have declined to make any public statements relative to the part that has been taken by Secretary Ballinger in the case of the Cunningham Coal entries in Alaska. There has been considerable comment on this matter, and today Acting Secretary Frank Pierce said: "Soon after Secretary Ballinger assumed office some phase of these cases came up officially before the department. The secretary called for me and stated that he had been called into consultation about the cases before his appointment and that he would have nothing whatever to do with them and directed that all matters relating to them should be handled entirely by myself and the commissioner of the general land office. Since the secretary assumed office he has had nothing whatever to do with these cases, and all matters relating to them have been handled either directly by myself or through the general land office."

UP TO LEGISLATURE.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 20.—What for several weeks appeared to be an incipient effort toward the re-establishment of horse racing in Louisiana has now been crystallized into an organized movement to bring the question of race track betting up before the legislature in the coming spring. Both the city park and the fair grounds race tracks are being kept in condition.
