KANE PLANS GREAT BOXING TOURNAMENT

Spokane, Aug. 20.—A combination boxing and billiard tournament to take place in Spokane in 1930, extending over two or three weeks is planned by Ed Kane, manager of the Willie Hoppe, the billiard champion. "My plan," explains Kane "is to have each state in the Union and each province in Canada hold a tournament to select its best lightweight amateur, bringing all these to Spokane. The contests here would settle all the eastern, western and Canadian championships and the final winner would be definitely determined as the American lightweight amateur champion. Billiard tournaments could also be arranged."


GAMES AT CITY PARK MUST BE ARRANGED FOR

STRANG WINS FAST HUNDRED-MILE EVENT

NOT A SINGLE SERIOUS ACCIDENT MARS SECOND DAY'S AUTO-MOBILE RACING.

The feature was the easy victory of Strang, who drove a Buick in the 100-mile race. Strang led all the way and won by about 10 miles in the exceptional time of 1:32:45. At first it was thought it was a new 100-mile record but officials announced that they had decided to allow the mark of 1:32:18 9-16 made by Chevrolet in the first 100 miles of the 250-mile race yesterday, to stand, despite the fact that Chevrolet did not finish the race.

Strang, however, beat Chevrolet's records for nearly all the distances between 20 and 100 miles. Strang's time was more than 11 minutes better than the 100-mile track record made by Burman at Columbus, Ohio, on July 3, of this year. Burman's record was made on a one-mile track.

Dewitt, in a Buick, finished second to Strang in the 100-mile race in 1:41:32 3-10 and Stillman in a Marmon was third in 1:42:37 6-10. Harroun in a Marmon was the only other of the seven starters to finish. The Buick (Chevrolet); Marlon, (Monson); and Marlon, (Stutz) dropped out early in the race. Strang never stopped once during the 100 miles, his car working like a carefully adjusted piece of delicate mechanism. His pace was uniform throughout.

Sanction Not Withdrawn.
The American Automobile association will not withdraw its sanction from the meet as its officials are satisfied that the speedway owners have done all in their power to make the course safe. Every inch of it was oiled and tarred and the bad spots repaired as much as possible.

Johnson Will Bet There is No Fight
Los Angeles, Aug. 20.—"I am anxious to bet \$1,000 that Jeffries will never get into a ring with me," is the way Jack Johnson, champion heavyweight pugilist of the world, answered a question tonight as to what he thought about the probability of a championship battle with the Los Angeles man. "I make this offer in Jeffries' home city in the hope that someone will take it up," he added.

The champion will leave for San Francisco, where he will begin light training. He says he does not know for exactly what fight he will train. An attempt is being made to match Johnson with Jim Barry for a fight to take place in this city about the middle of September. Johnson appears to be out of condition and much heavier than when last here.

Frayne outclassed Hyland and had a lead in every round after the 10th. The fight up to this period was rather tame and uninteresting, with the advantage belonging to neither man. After the 10th round Frayne tore loose and gave Hyland a systematic beating. Frayne's punches were clean, forceful and well timed. In the 18th round he all but sent Hyland to the floor with terrific left and right smashes to the jaw and uppercuts to the body. Hyland was a 10-to-8 favorite, and in the preliminary Atwell was a top-heavy choice over Cove.
