



FOOTBALL SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

THE EASTERN COLLEGES PREPARE FOR THE SEASON—CHANGES IN RULES.

With the opening of the football season less than a month away, the coaches of the larger colleges are beginning to call out their candidates, and already several of the stronger teams are in good playing shape.

Field Goal to Count Three.

The biggest change which the rules committee made was in regard to kick over goal from the field. Considerable objection has been raised for several years in regard to the rule, which gives four points for a kick over the goal posts, for it gives a light team with a strong kicker, which would otherwise be outclassed, an opportunity to defeat a heavier aggregation, provided it can get within striking distance of the goal.

The Forward Pass.

Despite the numerous objections which were raised to the much mooted forward pass, that play field its own in fine shape this fall, and aside from designating more clearly the men who may handle the pass the rules regarding the play are untouched.

This year a man must be one yard back of the neutral zone or else at the end of the line of scrimmage before he may participate in the handling of the pass. Some of the eastern men wished the rule to be changed so as to allow the ball to be tossed directly over the line of scrimmage, but the western conference, men, who supported the old rule, were victorious and no changes were made.

May Kick or Run.

Another important ruling was made in regard to the touchback. Last fall it was mandatory for the defending side after a touchback to punt out from the 25-yard line. This year it is optional with the defending team whether it shall start by kick or scrimmage. This ruling was made in order to go away with the practice of kicking the ball over the goal line during a heavy wind, thus forcing the opposing team to punt out in the face of the gale.

The Schedule.

Already the larger schools have announced their schedules. The eastern colleges are ready for the season and their games have been fixed for months.

One of the most noticeable features which the schedule shows is the growing reverence of the larger colleges for the smaller ones. Last year demonstrated thoroughly how the small college could compete with its bigger rival, and, made aster by their narrow escapes from defeat last year, Yale, Harvard, Princeton and Pennsylvania have all held off the semi-minor colleges until the end of the season. For instance, Yale will not play Brown until November 6, just before its game with Harvard and Princeton, while Harvard will play its next to the last game with Dartmouth.

Quakers Ostracised.

Another surprising feature is the fact that the University of Pennsylvania is included on neither of the schedule of Harvard nor Yale, and that Princeton will not meet Harvard. The schedule of eastern games explains itself and is as follows:
