HAMILTON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO BE PROVIDED WITH BUILDING.

GLENN H. CURTISS MAKES A REMARKABLE FLIGHT OVER THE REIMS COURSE.

PROPOSITION IS ACCEPTED HE BECOMES A FAVORITE

Offer of Bitter Root Stock Farm Company to Build a Structure on Second Street for the Occupancy of the Commercial Body is Approved at a Meeting of Organization.

Lowers Speed Record of Course Measuring Six and One-half Miles to Five Minutes Thirty-five and Two-fifths Seconds—Declares He Did Not Push Machine to Its Limit.

Hamilton, Mont., Aug. 23.—Hamilton to have a chamber of commerce building. This was settled at a meeting of the chamber held here tonight. The offer of the Bitter Root Stock Farm to erect a building which it will rent to the commercial body was accepted after other propositions had been thoroughly considered and rejected.

Despite the Trouble Three Columns of Smoke Were Issuing From Chimneys of the Plant Last Night—Strikers Seem to Realize That the Troops and Police Are Too Much for Them.
