## DEER LODGE GRABS SECOND GAME

### CONVICTS ANNEX EVENING CONTEST IN PITCHERS' BATTLE ON SOUTH SIDE.

With Dellar pitching air-tight ball and Butler a little off form, the Deer Lodge baseball team grabbed the second and last of the Missoula series by a score of 3 to 0 in a contest pulled off last evening on the south side diamond, just before early candle light. Despite the fact that the discard of Sunday allowed but four safe ones and had sensational support at all times, the two teams would have been batting yet, but for three unfortunate circumstances. Before the skirmish started the local management overlooked a bet, in that it failed to fringe the visitors for horseshoes. Everything broke right for the convicts. The three circumstances alluded to above accounted each for one run. In the first part of the second frame, after Hurley had reached second on an error and an overthrow, Butler threw the ball into the outer gardens in an attempt to nab the visitors' center fielder. Hurley gulped around and rang up the first count for the invading forces.

The second catastrophe was scheduled for the sixth inning. After Butler had walked Bender, the first man up for the round, and Sues had singled to left and had been massacred when Hurley rolled to Ball, Freeman coaxed a slow one down toward third and Gieb, a new man, picked the leather up and held it until too late to throw it anywhere, while Bender snaked home with the second tally. The horseshoe theory is further upheld by an accident of the seventh, when the jailbirds enhanced their chances by another long, straight mark on the scoreboard. With two down, Mackin singled to left field and Whiteman lost the ball in the grass. The sphere remained lost long enough to permit the little shortstop to register, although he was safe at the plate by a narrow margin, Whiteman having located the horsehide after the arrival of a relief party from the infield.

These three mishaps gave Deer Lodge three and at no other time were the visitors able to connect consecutively. Butler allowed only half a dozen safeties and these he kept well scattered. He handed out three sets of fours to the opposition, however, and one of these was responsible for a tally. The game was a pitchers' battle and was reeled off in the fast time of an hour and a quarter.

his balance at the psychological moment? Dellar certainly came back strong yesterday. Sunday he was hammered for eight tallies in one frame and last night he had the locals on his hip from going to gong. He had everything last night and the Giants were not dangerous in more than two rounds.
