The trouble was renewed outside of the depot and the altercation became so noticeable that the attention of the officers was drawn to the scene. Biehl started to run and the officers followed close behind. A number of shots were fired, but to no avail, and the fleeing young man might have been going yet had he not run into the arms of Harry Allen, a well-known Northern Pacific engineer. Biehl claims that he was merely assisting the other man to pick up the money, while Bray claims that Biehl intended to rob him. Bray was locked in the city jail, as a witness, while Biehl furnished bonds for his release.
