EXODUS OF HUNTERS MARKS TODAY

OPENING OF THE DUCK SEASON TAKES MANY SPORTSMEN TO THE OPEN.

"Tell the hunters for us that they may shoot not more than 29 ducks in one day, and that they must not kill anything but ducks, geese, brant and swan. There is no limit on geese, brant and swan, but not more than 29 ducks must be killed during any one day. Any persons shooting grouse, prairie chickens, fool hen, sage hen, pheasant or partridge are liable to a fine of \$50. Tell them, also, that a game warden has the right of searching any game bag he wishes to, and that he will be in the field today. It is also well to remind the public that a non-resident must pay \$10 for a license to shoot small game, and that when the big game season opens next month it will cost him \$25. This applies to all aliens also."

With every livery rig and automobile in the city engaged, with the sporting departments of all stores depleted of guns and ammunition, and with hundreds of licenses with ink still wet, the opening of the duck season today promises to exceed any comparable ever staged in western Montana—near Missoula, anyway. All day yesterday hunting parties were leaving in automobiles, wagons and on horseback, and this morning the dawn will find hundreds of sportsmen along the rivers and lakes and in the marshes and sloughs of this part of the state. Many other hunters started out before daylight this morning and the slaughter of ducks should be something memorable.

More than \$500 worth of ammunition was sold by one store alone yesterday, and all of Missoula's dealers in firearms and their accessories did a land office business all day. AN INVESTIGATION TO BE HAD

SUPERVISOR OF SANTA BARBARA FOREST REQUESTED TO RESIGN HIS POST.

Santa Barbara, Cal., Aug. 31.—Gifford Pinchot's visit to this city next Thursday, has taken on additional interest since it became known that William Slosson, supervisor of the Santa Barbara forest reserve, was asked to resign two months ago by the federal authorities in San Francisco and refused. It is said that Slosson in reply to this demand for his resignation, replied that he would quit the service only after an investigation had established some delinquency on his part.

Slosson, who is said to be the oldest member of the forest service on the Pacific coast, was personally acquainted with Mr. Pinchot before the latter took charge of the forestry service. He is said to have referred the complaint to Mr. Pinchot. Senator Flint has promised that an investigation will be made.

WOULD HAVE ORDER COUNTERMANDED NOW

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 31.—Gordon LeFevre of Richmond, Va., J. H. Booker, Jr., of West Point, Ga., Chauncey C. Devore of Wheeling, W. Va., and Richard W. Hooker of Kansas City, Mo., together with Congressman Borland, of the Fifth Missouri district, held a conference with Secretary of War Dickinson yesterday at his home, Bellemeade, in an effort to secure the countermanding of an order dismissing them from West Point military academy for participating in the hazing of Cadet Rolando Sutton, a brother of Lieutenant Sutton, who met death at Annapolis recently. It is said that while Judge Dickinson recorded the boys' every possible courtesy and expressed a willingness to go over the record again if they so desired, three of the boys left without waiting for the record to reach the city.

BARON ALCYON WINS.

Readville, Mass., Aug. 31.—The Syracuse, N. Y. stallion Baron Alcyon today won the second renewal of the American trotting Derby at the Readville track by three lengths from Axtator. It was one of the most spectacular races ever seen. From the time the word was given until the horses were within 15 yards of the wire the winner was in doubt.

A JOINT INQUIRY NOT SATISFACTORY

Pekin, Au. 31.—China has declined the proposal made by Sir John Jordan, the British minister, for a joint investigation of the killing in Kan Su province last June of Hazrahall, an Indian surveyor attached to the meteorological expedition under Lieutenant F. S. Clark, a former officer of the United States army. Henry P. Fletcher, the American charge d'affaires, concurred in the British demand. China gives as her reason that it is impossible to bring witnesses from Kan Su province.
