Mr. and Mrs. Cyr will leave Wednesday for Missoula, Mont., where they will make their home—Des Moines (Iowa) Capital.

REVIVAL OF MATCH AROUSES INTEREST

Sea Girt, N. J., Sept. 5.—A feature of the Tri-State tournament of the New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania Rifle association here yesterday, was the revival of the Nevada trophy match by the Association of American & International Rifleman. The trophy was competed for at 600, 900 and 1,000 yards and was won by C. W. Chesley, Second Connecticut, with a score of 143.

The interstate regimental team match was won by the First District of Columbia with a score of 764. The Italian Rifle association of New York captured the Old Guard trophy with a score of 251. The Third New Jersey finished in the lead in the Columbia trophy match with 1,884.

A LIVELY WEEK IS EXPECTED ON THE RANGE AT SEA GIRT THIS WEEK.

Sea Girt, N. J., September 4.—The joint rifle tournaments of the New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania State Rifle associations are now in full swing and next week promises to be one of the liveliest that dear old Sea Girt has ever witnessed. The shooting to date has been of high order and interesting contests are expected next week. The attendance is excellent and every day hundreds of visitors from the nearby Jersey resorts are on the range cheering the riflemen to do their best. Tomorrow the week will open with the contest for the Swiss trophy at 500 yards. This is the easiest of the longer ranges, but the conditions require that a competitor shall cease firing as soon as he gets out of the bull. As many as 20 bullets have been made in practice frequently, but never in a contest. The Hale match at 600 yards, New Jersey officers' and inspectors' match and the New York team match will also be shot tomorrow. On Tuesday the Spencer (N. J.) Crullshank (N. Y.) and Maxim long range (Pa.) will be shot. The latter calls for 10 shots at 1,000 yards, in which the Maxim Silencer can be used. Hiram P. Maxim, the well-known inventor, has given \$200 and a handsome trophy for this match.

September 8 the Thurston long range match, with 15 shots at 800 and 900 yards, will take place, together with the McAlpin team match and the mid-range match at 500 yards. The program for Thursday is the heaviest of the week, comprising, as it does, the Gould rapid-fire match, the Seventy-first regiment, New York State Rifle association, New York revolver team, New Jersey revolver team and the New Jersey all comers' military revolver match. Friday will see the most important contest of all, being that for the Dryden trophy, presented by former Senator Dryden of New Jersey for ten years of eight. This is probably the handsomest trophy for rifle shooting in the United States and always brings out a good field. It is shot at 200, 600 and 1,000 yards. On Friday the new Libbey trophy match, for which the trophy was presented by Lieutenant Colonel William Libbey of New Jersey, will also be shot. This interesting match will be shot at 1,800 yards, the competitors being allowed to continue shooting as long as they make bulls or holes. The press match at 500 yards completes the day. The tournament will be brought to an end on Saturday with the off-hand match, veteran team match and the Sea Girt championship match.

MAY FORCE MEMBERS TO OBEY ITS RULES

New York, Sept. 5.—The New York stock exchange can continue to enforce a rule of its board of governors prohibiting its members from dealing with members of the Consolidated stock exchange, under a decision rendered by Justice Crane of the New York state supreme court in Brooklyn. Marcus Heintz, a member of the Consolidated exchange, applied to Justice Crane for an injunction against the New York stock exchange, alleging that the rule constitutes a restraint on trade, and would make the New York stock exchange a monopoly in a legal sense. Justice Crane yesterday refused to make the injunction permanent.

MEXICANS TO PICK FIRST COTTON CROP

Imperial, Cal., Sept. 5.—Two hundred Mexicans have arrived to begin picking the first cotton crop ever raised in California. The present crop covers about 1,500 acres and those who have been following the experiment predict that cotton will become one of the most important products of the imperial valley. A cotton gin has been installed at El Centro and all of the crop picked this year will be handled there. It is said that the profits to the growers this season will be from \$50 to \$75 an acre.

TEN NEW CONTESTS ENGAGE IN A GAME OF "FLY-LOO"

MORE CARLOAD LOTS OF APPLES WILL BE EXHIBITED AT SPOKANE FAIR. A POPULAR CHINESE GAME OF CHANCE INDULGED IN BY PROMINENT MEN.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 4.—Ten new contests in the carnival class are announced for the National Apple show in Spokane, November 15 to 20. These are in addition to the sweepstakes, in which \$1,000 in gold is offered as first money and \$500 to the second. These added premiums, which will make the competition the greatest prize event of its kind, follow:

First prize \$500, and \$100 as second money for the best car of each of these varieties: Spitzenberg, Yellow Newtown, Gano, Delicious, Winesap, Rome Beauty, Wagener, Jonathan, McIntosh and one for any variety not mentioned in the foregoing. Entries in these events have a chance for the grand prize.

A gift of \$1,000, by Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific Railway company, who is also head of the second apple show, and one of \$500 by J. L. Evans, president of the Washington State Horticultural society, prompted the board of trustees, headed by E. F. Cartier Van Dassel, to reorganize the carload events and add premiums to bring the total to \$5,000.

Substantial additions have also been made to the general prize list, now composed of 19 classes, with cash prizes, tracts of irrigated and non-irrigated lands, trophy cups, machinery, spray materials and medals of a total value of \$25,000. The classes include 10-box, five-box and single-box, state, provincial and district exhibits and limited contests, such as barrel, box, basket, jar, pyramid and plate displays. There will also be cash and other premiums for photographs of orchards and prizes for home-made and factory products.

Ren H. Rice, secretary-manager, announces there will be concerts by orchestral bands, also exhibitors' conventions and meetings of horticultural societies during the progress of the show.

A WESTERN TEAM WINS CUP AGAIN

Wheaton, Ill., Sept. 5.—The Olympic cup was yesterday won for the third time by the golf team representing the Western Golf association. Incidentally, the team made the lowest medal score by nine strokes ever made during competition for the trophy, the total for 36 holes for four men being 623 strokes, an average of about 41-3 strokes per hole.

Only four teams contested. They represented the Western Ohio State, St. Louis and Wisconsin Golf associations. Not a team was entered from any of the associations in the east affiliated with the United States Golf association.

INCREASED ACTIVITY.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Increasing agricultural, industrial and mining activity is indicated by advance sheets of the fortnightly statement of car surpluses and shortages compiled by President Hale of the American Railway association. The statement will show that on September 1 the surplus of cars of all kinds had been reduced more than 40,000, bringing the surplus down to a little more than 100,000 cars of all kinds.

BANKER KILLS SELF.

Ironwood, Mich., Sept. 5.—Former President Herman J. Jahn of the First National bank of Ironwood committed suicide today by shooting himself through the heart. The bank failed in June and the president and other officials were to have been tried in the federal court next week on criminal charges.
