

PROMINENT WOMAN IS DEAD

MRS. NETTIE M'CLUNG EXPIRES AT HOME OF HER DAUGHTER AT THE AGE OF 62.

Mrs. Nettie McClung, an old-time resident of the city, died at 2:30 yesterday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. T. C. Moore, 121 North Third street. Death came after a lingering illness of several weeks, the cause being a complication of diseases. The deceased was about 62 years of age. She came to Montana in 1882 from her home in New York. She made her home in Missoula and lived in the city for two years, during which her husband was a deputy under Sheriff Houston. In 1884 Mr. McClung became sheriff of the county and the family moved to the Battleshake, where they lived for several years, moving later to Clinton.

Mrs. McClung is survived by a daughter, Mrs. J. C. Moore; a son, J. L. McClung; two sisters, Mrs. Alice Bevin of St. Paul and Mrs. Julia Lambkin of Wisconsin, and two brothers, Martin E. Schaeffer of Martin, N. D., and Charles Schaeffer of Bismark, N. D. All of the relatives have been notified of her death.
