

HANSEN TELLS OF PEARY'S CONDUCT

RELATES STORY OF COMMANDER'S USURPATION OF EXPLORER'S STORES.

A REMARKABLE RECITAL

Danish Physician Who Was With Dr. Cook in Greenland for a Time Declares That Naval Officer Left Boatswain in Possession of Rival's Stores—Cook Begged for Entrance.

Copenhagen, Sept. 12.—A remarkable letter, giving Dr. Frederick A. Cook's version of the trouble with Commander Peary over supplies, appears in the Politiken. The letter was written by Dr. Norman Hansen, a prominent Danish physician, who several times visited Greenland to study eye diseases. Dr. Cook told practically the same story to one of his closest American friends just a week ago, before Commander Peary appeared on the scene, but said he did not intend to make it public because it might lead to unpleasantness.

Dr. Hansen was with Dr. Cook for some time in Greenland and returned with him on the Danish steamer Hans Egede.

"Now that Dr. Cook has gone," he writes, "I am no longer under any obligations to keep silent and will exercise my right to publish the story about the house in Annetook, a story which Dr. Cook himself had too much delicacy to relate to the world. I write it from memory, as Dr. Cook told it to me, and I am fully convinced that in no detail are my recollections wrong."

Dr. Cook had built his house for stores in Annetook, north of Etah, and it was this depot which he started to reach in February, 1909, crossing Smith sound. It was a pretty large house, the walls being built of heavily filled provision boxes, so that Dr. Cook knew that when this important point was reached everything was safe. He had, before the start, given permission to a young friend named Whitney to use the house while hunting musk oxen for sport in the winter of 1908-09.

Installs Boatswain.

"When Dr. Cook and his two Eskimos, exhausted and half starved, came within a short distance of the house in Annetook, young Whitney came out to bid him welcome, but inside the house was a stranger, a giant New Foundland boatswain, on watch. This man had been placed in Dr. Cook's house by Peary, when the latter passed Etah with his ship bound north. Peary had given the boatswain a written order, which commenced with the following words:

"This house belongs to Dr. Frederick A. Cook, but Dr. Cook is long ago dead and there is no use to search after him. Therefore, I, Commander Robert E. Peary, install my boatswain in this deserted house."

"This paper the boatswain, who could neither read nor write, exhibited to Dr. Cook and the latter took a copy.

"This copy, however, he does not intend to publish if Peary's course does not force him to do so. Dr. Cook gave me a lively account of how the whole winter was treated like a dog by the boatswain and how he had witnessed the sailor bartering Dr. Cook's provisions for fox and bear skins for him. Dr. Cook also had to put a good face on the unpleasant situation. He had to get into his own house and had to make a compromise with the boatswain. Dr. Cook made a present of the house with all of its contents to two faithful Eskimos, with the provision that Whitney was to have the use of the house as long as his hunting trip lasted, but he was compelled to let the boatswain continue his watch. The boatswain, however, received strict orders not to exchange any more of the provisions or guns.

Keeps Records.

"To Mr. Whitney, Dr. Cook gave his instruments and his observations, as he thought these precious things were safer there than on the long sledge trip in the spring, across Melville bay, but all his notebooks and soiled record books, which have been so closely written upon, he kept and carried with him.

"To me, who understands very little astronomy, the record written down so closely and in all directions was very hard to read, but what is the record to us? The two men, Peary and Cook, their character, their conduct, that is what interests us, and every little item throwing a slight upon their natures is valuable."

CHURCH IS BURNED.

Seattle, Sept. 12.—The Presbyterian mission at Point Barrow, Alaska, in the Arctic ocean, the most northerly church in the world, and which was built in 1896 by Mrs. Elliot E. Shepard of New York, was burned on April 12.

BIG AUDIENCE AT OPERA HOUSE

DR. H. O. BREEDEN DELIVERS INSPIRING ADDRESS AT HARBOR THEATER.

MAKES GOOD IMPRESSION

Noted Evangelist Opens Revival Meetings in Missoula Before Large Congregations and Preaches Sermons Revealing a Richly-Stored Mind and Simple Eloquence.

In the three sermons delivered by him in the opening of the revival meetings in the Christian church yesterday, Dr. H. O. Breeden more than met the high expectations of those who were instrumental in bringing him to the city. If any went to hear him expecting to be swept off their feet by a restless flood of impassioned oratory, they were, agreeably or otherwise, disappointed. Instead they heard a quiet and pleasing flow of inspiring and helpful ideas couched in plain, simple, forceful phraseology and rendered luminous by apt and ample illustrations. Dr. Breeden's sermons reveal a mind richly stored with valuable information gathered from books and travel. To people who read and think they are very fond of refreshment, Dr. Breeden is endowed with sufficient imagination and heart-power to lift his sermons high above the point of barrenness and frigidity. He makes his hearers see and feel the great truths he preaches. No suspicion of either rant or cant attaches to his work. He is a big, broad man with a big, cultured brain and a sympathetic heart. There is nothing narrow or sectarian about him. His sympathies are with all men who are trying to know and serve God. His message is the gospel of Christ, and he delivers it with winning grace and convincing force.

The Evening Services.

Nearly one thousand people listened to the evangelist's evening sermon at the Harnois theater on the subject, "We Would See Jesus." The combined congregations of the churches which have joined in these revival meetings and many people drawn by the prospects of hearing a man of national reputation filled the big auditorium and from the start to the finish of the meeting the audience was held spell-bound. Dr. Breeden treated his subject in a logical and masterful way, his train of thought being simple enough for all to follow and yet convincing enough to stir all. The present attitude of man, he argued, is to blame for the fact that he does not see Christ. Blinder than the man who is led about by a boy or by a dog is he who cannot see the truth. "The life of Jesus and His preachings solve everything," he said, "and nothing but a realization of the greatness and the divinity of the Christ can heal the spiritual blindness of man."

Music for the evening was furnished by H. S. Saxton and the combined choirs of the Christian and Presbyterian churches.

His first audience was an inspiring one. It filled the house and responded to his every utterance. In the afternoon there was a most helpful workers' meeting.



All Christians and the public generally are invited to participate in these services. Dr. Breeden's theme tonight will be, "Why Are Our Prayers Not Answered?"

SALT LAKE PHONE MAN VISITS VALLEY TOWNS

P. H. Hopkins of Salt Lake, general commercial superintendent of the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company, returned yesterday from a trip up the Bitter Root, where, in company with Division Superintendent P. M. Harding of Missoula, he inspected the exchanges of the valley. A number of new exchanges and improvements are announced in the valley line. A new pair of copper wires has been strung between Hamilton and Stevensville, giving a much better service between these two towns, and work has been ordered started on a new exchange at Victor, which will give service to about 75 people in that town and its vicinity. PEARY HAS PLENTY OF EVIDENCE READY

SECRETARY OF ARCTIC CLUB SAYS COMMANDER WILL DISPROVE COOK'S CLAIM.

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 12.—Plenty of evidence designed to back up his statement that Dr. Cook did not reach the north pole is in the hands of Commander Peary, according to assertions made here tonight. This view is taken by a large number of explorers, scientists and others who are here to greet the explorer.

Commander Peary will have with him irrefutable proof to support every statement he has made in connection with Dr. Cook's trip to the Arctic. Herbert L. Bridgman, secretary of the Peary Arctic club, said, "Every one who knows Peary realizes he never makes statements unless he can prove them absolutely. When the proper time arrives, and that will be when Dr. Cook has made his statement over his signature, the proof will be forthcoming. I quite agree with President Hubbard of the Peary Arctic club that Dr. Cook might have learned weeks ago in Greenland of Commander Peary's discovery and that in the interim he wove the story of his discovery of the north pole. News, you know, travels fast among the Eskimos and it is quite likely Dr. Cook heard of what Peary had done."

Mr. Bridgman said he felt much flattered that Commander Peary had stated that he was "the only logical candidate for the polar commission."

"The Belgian government in 1906," said Bridgman, "invited the several nations to attend an international polar commission. The United States designated me to act as its representative at the congress and I took my credentials from the various geographical societies, Arctic and explorers' clubs. Two years later a definite call for a meeting of the commission was issued and the conference was held in Brussels in May of that year."

"The commission was designed to develop a sort of co-ordinate working system of Arctic exploration which would have presented just the sort of controversy that now has arisen. The commission also planned to define the work of the geographical and other scientific branches of such Arctic exploration in order that the results of each expedition might be determined and labor economized. I reported to the state department at Washington and later Commander Peary was designated as the commissioner for this country."

"Commander Peary felt I should be made commissioner, but nothing further was done in the matter."

Sydney is putting on a holiday appearance for the coming of Peary. United States flags are displayed everywhere and the headquarters of the welcoming party is besieged with visitors inquiring for the latest news. The French frigate Isty is here and probably will remain in the harbor to aid in the welcome of Peary. No British warship is expected.

Peary will likely remain here two days and then go with his family to his home in Casco bay, Maine, where he will rest for a day or two, proceeding thence to Washington to make his official report to the government.

Commander Peary is moving southward in the same precise manner that characterized his methodical and well-calculated dash for the pole. The Roosevelt is being overhauled and painted at Assizes harbor, near Battle Harbor, and her commander has ordered that every injury sustained in her long stay in the ice cradle of Cape Sheridan shall be removed before she sails for this port.

PLANS TO DECORATE RECEPTION HALL ELABORATELY

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 12.—President Diaz is determined that the Janquet hall in which he will entertain President Taft on October 16 shall be decorated in a style befitting the high rank of his guest, and has ordered a number of the most valuable paintings from the gallery of the palace of Chapultepec sent to Juarez, to be hung in the reception hall. Included in the lot are portraits of George Washington, Benito Juarez and General Morelos. The work of decoration is under the direction of a famous artist from Paris, and is being pushed rapidly.

A PIONEER MINER IS DEAD

W. R. H. EDWARDS, WHO HAS RESIDED IN MONTANA FORTY-SEVEN YEARS, DIES.

Special to The Daily Missoulian. Butte, Sept. 12.—W. R. H. Edwards, a native of Pennsylvania, and a resident of Montana for 47 years, died this evening, aged 76 years. Heart trouble was the cause and his illness lasted only a few hours. Edwards was one of the best known of the old-timers of the state. He came to Bannock in 1862 and remained there for two seasons, returning to Fort Wayne, Ind., late in the fall of the second year. He was back in Bannock the following year and ever since has been an honored resident of Montana. In 1885 he located in German gulch and since that time has had mining interests there, a placer miner during early days and a quartz miner up to the time he died. Edwards was born in Chambersburg, Pa., and in 1841 he came as far west as Fort Wayne, Ind., where he taught school in 1859.

In 1852 he crossed the plains to California, where he remained until 1857, being a school teacher at times, a placer miner and an attorney at law as well. In 1857 he again returned to Fort Wayne, but the gold fever had him and he came back in 1859 and was in the Elk's peak rush.

Before 1859 he was again in Fort Wayne and was married there during that year. Five children survive him, two being in Washington, the others in Butte and Anaconda. Edwards was one of the best-pooped men in the state on pioneer history and he left behind him a number of detailed stories of pioneer life. He was a member of the Society of Montana Pioneers, the only organization with which he had membership.

LAST QUARTER.

SWIFT IS CERTAIN OF DR. COOK'S SUCCESS

ALASKAN DECLARES THAT EXPLORER IS MAN OF GREAT DARING AND ABILITY.

Seattle, Sept. 12.—Captain E. A. Swift of the barge Neptune, which arrived in port today, declares that he has faith in Dr. Cook and not only believes that he discovered the north pole, but also that he ascended Mt. McKinley.

"Dr. Cook is brave, fearless and a born leader of men," said Captain Swift. "At the time he entered Alaska he talked of ascending Mt. McKinley and he made a proposition to me that I refused because of his daring. Dr. Cook proposed that I take him up the Chullina rapids, through the box canyon, in his launch. I had never seen the rapids, but knew that the trip would be very dangerous and I declined to try it. Dr. Cook took two men and went through the rapids. Afterwards I met a miner who told me he had seen the launch in the canyon with full power on, making slow but sure headway up stream."

"After Dr. Cook ascended the rapids he landed at the base of the mountain on the south side, where he followed beaten tracks of animals up the mountain. This he told me afterwards, and I know him well enough to be certain that he ascended Mt. McKinley at that time as he claimed."

FORMER MONTANAN STRANGELY MISSING

Spokane, Sept. 12.—The Evening Chronicle printed the following item recently:

"What has become of George Williams, aged 35 years, former restaurateur, keeper and possessor of a sum of money which he obtained from the sale of a lodging house? Has he been done away with by robbers or is he spending the proceeds of the sale?"

"These are questions for which the police of this city are asked to find an answer by John Osakes of Libby, Mont., friend of the aged man, whose failure to hear from Williams led him to make an investigation. It is not known on what day the hotel man was last seen."

"Williams, who formerly ran a hotel at Libby, came to Spokane last fall. Here he opened the Central lodging house. This place he sold recently. Since then, so far as is known, he has been missing."
