WASHINGTON NEWS

THE MISSOULIAN'S SPECIAL SERVICE.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 12.—The census bureau estimates that 450 men will be required to enumerate the population and statistics of Montana during the next census.

The census bureau will appoint about 65,000 enumerators to take the census of this country, Hawaii and Porto Rico, beginning April 15, next.

Oklahoma and Washington have had the biggest increase in population during the past year.

A postoffice has been ordered established at Tyler, Ferguson county, with Charles W. Tyler in charge.

Herman C. Sailor has been appointed fourth class postmaster at Asarok.

Star postal service has been ordered established between Norris and Virginia City, and Augusta and Vaughn.

Private Otto H. Farmer, of Company I, at Fort Missoula, has purchased his discharge from the army.

Orders have been issued by the war department detailing the 6th Infantry band at Fort William Henry Harrison to a month's tour of duty at Fort Lincoln, N. D., beginning September 20.

Field officers at Fort Missoula and other forts in Montana and the department of the Dakotas have been directed by the war department to undergo the famous Roosevelt physical endurance in riding or walking tests from now until October 31.

A conference of appraisers of merchandise will be held at New York on November 8, to continue through the 18th, to which the appraiser at Great Falls has been requested to attend.

According to a report of the geological survey floods are increasing. As to water power, it is stated that more than five and a third million horsepower has been developed.
