

The picture culminates happily, however. "Justified" is an intensely dramatic subject, which depicts a story of mistaken love.

Wallace, Sept. 12.—The probate judge has given judgment against William Hare of Missoula for \$92, due the United Stores company of Mullan. Household goods belonging to Hare were attached before Hare left Mullan. He was formerly a millman at the Morning mine.
