## THE PARKER SHOWS TO ENTERTAIN

### EXTRAVAGANZA ORGANIZATION TO FURNISH AMUSEMENT AT SEATTLE FAIR.

Spokane, Sept. 12.—The "Midway" at the Spokane Interstate fair this year, September 29 to 27, will again be enlivened by the great extravaganza of attractions known as the Parker shows, which were seen at the Interstate fair last year for the first time outside of the middle east and the Atlantic coast. The shows come with seven more caravans of trained animals and scenery for their diversified features than were brought last year, 22 caravans in all being billed for the Interstate fair this year, besides two cars used to transport the star performers. Eighteen freak and vaudeville performances, separate and distinct, will be given by the Parker shows this year.

It is the speed attained by the aeronauts in dropping to earth that will capture the prizes this year in the balloon races at the Spokane Interstate fair; and, as the aeronauts will be dropping in parachutes, not the safest aerial conveyances under the best of circumstances, there may be some uncertainty as to whether some may not drop even faster than they desire, for in that lies the skill of the contestant. He must so maneuver his parachute so as to prevent its opening too quickly and retarding his downward swoop. So far this year, however, there have been no fatalities amongst the aeronauts of the Curtis-Mack company, who are putting on the balloon races at the Interstate fair.

Several long trains will be required to transport all the livestock already entered, and it is stated by John L. Smith, superintendent of the Interstate fair livestock department, that there are many more promised entries yet to be heard from. It was found necessary last month to enlarge the livestock quarters for this year's fair, though, after enlarging them last year, it was thought they would surely suffice for the exhibits expected at any future fair for several years.

Who may capture the \$1,000 purse offered for the Capture Relay race is going to be a matter for conjecture. There are many good riders of established fame as relay contestants entered this year. Among them are Dell Hanson of Endicott, Wash.; Ernest Williams of Rockford, Wash.; Joseph T. Settle of DeSmet, Idaho; Joe Garrick and Andrew St. John of Rockford, Wash.; George Tyler of Dayton, Wash.; John Smith and Arthur Dexter of Seattle; A. E. Stowell of Colfax, Wash., and Charles Allard of Polson, Mont.

Thursday and Friday of the horse show are going to be interesting days for lovers of good horseflesh, and particularly for lovers of good work horses. Special attention has been paid by the horse show this year to the securing of entries of heavy draft and light delivery horses, with the result that on the two closing days of the horse show—which runs four days this year—there will be seen, probably, more prize-winning or deserving work stock than many people have seen gathered together in one exhibition.

The ninth annual Derby will be run September 21 and, as in former years, there is much conjecture amongst horsemen as to who may capture the \$1,000 purse. There will be some good horses entered from all over the country.

## ITALIAN HURTS SELF IN FIGHT

### CUTTING SCRAPE IN HAMILTON STREET RESULTS SERIOUSLY FOR KNIFER.

Hamilton, Sept. 12.—Jim Veto, an Italian laborer, lies in jail, with a deep knife wound in his stomach, and Dave A. Bishop, the chief of police here, is suffering from a deep gash in his left arm tonight as the result of a result of a cutting scrape on Main street, in which the Italian was the principal performer and chief victim. The circumstances of the trouble are unknown tonight, as no investigation has been made.

The current report of the affair is, however, as follows: The Italian and Ed Carroll, it appears, were fighting in the Bitter Root saloon, when reinforcements, in the persons of Carroll's two sons, drove Veto into the street. Here the Carrolls threw him down, the open knife, which he was carrying, penetrating his stomach as he fell. Chief of Police Bishop, seeing the rumpus, hurried to the scene. As he bent over to pull the Italian's assailant's away, Veto slashed him in the left arm, inflicting a serious wound. Veto was arrested, but as yet the Carrolls are free, the sheriff declaring that they will not be arrested until a complaint has been filed against them. Veto, who is a laborer on the Gilchrist ranch, is reported as being in a serious condition.
