Supervisor Elers Koch of the Lolo national forest has started a crew of men at work on the construction of a government telephone line, which will connect the Tolly creek ranger station, in the Coeur d'Alenes, with the Bell telephone system at Lathrop, the line to be about four miles in length. When this is completed the men will be put to work on the construction of lines connecting Iron Mountain, Quartz, St. Regis and Haugen. All of these lines will be for the exclusive use of government employes, and no private persons will be allowed connection.

PROMINENT OFFICIAL VISITS CITY

HEAD OF INTERNATIONAL HOTEL EMPLOYES SPENDS DAY IN GARDEN CITY.

T. J. Sullivan, general president of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees' International Alliance and the Bartenders' International League of America, who lives in Hartford, Conn., and has his headquarters in Cincinnati, O., arrived in Missoula yesterday on a general inspection tour, in the course of which he has visited or will visit all the locals of the American continent, including the 23 in Canada. Last evening he was given an entertainment at the hands of the craft in this city, the affair being given in the Cooks and Waiters' hall.

Mr. Sullivan is a pleasant and agreeable gentleman and one who has decided views on the prohibition movement, which is interesting the United States at the present time. Mr. Sullivan does not believe in prohibition and claims that by the overzealousness of that party the liquor question has become all the more involved. He says the members of his craft stand for the regulation of the saloon. He claims that the well-regulated saloon is the best argument for temperance, and believes that if the scope of the evil class of saloons were restricted by regulating legislation there would not be so many arguments against the liquor problem and the question of prohibition would not come up at all. To help in the regulation of saloons the craft of which he is the head requires that a charter shall not be given to bartenders in prohibition territory; also a man who takes out a union card in that order must be a citizen or have declared his intention of becoming such.

In his arguments against prohibition and its benefits Mr. Sullivan quotes from the example of the state of Maine. "This state has for 53 years been prohibition territory, and statistics show that in the city of Portland there are more arrests for drunkenness than in any other city of its size in the country. The liquor here is obtained by stealthy methods.

Mr. Sullivan is well informed on the prohibition problem and has many other arguments against it and many arguments in its favor. He will leave on the Coeur d'Alene train this morning for Wallace. From there he will go to Spokane, Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Salt Lake, visiting most of the locals on the way. He will go to Toronto during the second week in November to act as delegate to the convention of the American Federation of Labor.

During his stay in the city yesterday Mr. Sullivan was taken in charge by a committee representing the craft and shown the city in an automobile. He is very enthusiastic about Missoula. "I can see no reason," he said, "why your city should not be called the Garden City of Montana. It is certainly the prettiest place of its size I have ever seen. And if I were 25 years younger I would be either here or in some other part of your splendid state."

"PRAYER" IS THEME OF HIS SERMON

DR. H. O. BREEDEN SPEAKS ELOQUENTLY TO LARGE CONGREGATION.

In spite of the counter attraction at the Harbors theater, a large audience gathered at the Christian church last evening to hear Dr. H. O. Breeden's sermon on "Prayer." So much having been said on this theme, one not knowing the preacher might have asked: "What can he do more than reiterate what has been worn threadbare by repetition?" In his hands it became a new and vital subject. For an hour the large audience sat spell-bound under the wise words of the man of God as he unfolded the wonderful privilege and power of prayer. Standing before them without book or note other than a miniature New Testament which is held more for the sake of the hands than the head, and speaking in a voice that is rarely ever lifted above the conversational tone, along a pathway made beautiful by flowers culled from the poets and illuminated by lamps borrowed from the world's best literature, he led his hearers to the pearly gates that open to prayer. Not less pleasing and effective than the sermon was the solo by H. S. Saxton. "Tonight Dr. Breeden will preach on 'What and Where is Hell?'" The service will open promptly at 8 o'clock.
