CAREER OF FULTON IN FRANCE

WRITER LAYS CLAIM TO SHARE OF CREDIT IN INVENTION OF AMERICAN.

Paris, Sept. 15.—George Montorgueil, in an elaborate review of Robert Fulton's career in France, published today, reproduces an official account of Fulton's trial of the Seine January 26, 1800, and Fulton's own words saying that the real inspirations of his discovery were the experiments of Marquis Jouffroy at Lyons in 1783.

Thus, the writer goes to prove that "the steambot is a French invention, perfected in France by an American and exploited in America," and he says for this reason France is sending a member of the institute and detachment of her fleet to join in the "tribute of gratitude which America is paying to her illustrious son, who in many ways made the old world tributary to the new."

Continuing, M. Montorgueil declares that Fulton left France because the Napoleon government would not accept his Nautilus, a prototype of the submarine, with which Fulton told Napoleon he could destroy the English fleet. Subsequently Fulton offered the Nautilus to England, but England wanted to destroy the secret, whereupon Fulton went to America.

TAFT MAKES STATEMENT ON NEGRO SUFFRAGE

Washington, Sept. 15.—President Taft has placed himself on record, in a letter to a local newspaper, as being opposed to suffrage restrictions intended to discriminate against the negro race. In answer to a letter asking his opinion concerning the franchise amendment to the Maryland constitution, which is proposed by the democratic party in Maryland, the president says:

"It is deliberately drawn to impose educational and other qualifications for the suffrage upon negroes and to exempt everybody else from such qualifications.

"This is a gross injustice and is a violation of the spirit of the fifteenth amendment. It ought to be voted down by every one who is a democrat or republican who is in favor of a square deal."

RAILROAD OFFICIALS TO INSPECT DIVISION

Acting Superintendent Fowler left yesterday afternoon for Helena, where he will meet General Superintendent George A. Goodell, who is on his way here from Livingston. In a special train the two officials will make a thorough inspection of the Rocky Mountain division with all its branches. This morning they will leave for Darby over the Bitter Root branch. The plans for a new depot at that town will be looked into and the improvements all along the line, including those to be made between Missoula and Lolo, will be considered.

COMMISSIONERS FINISH INSPECTION OF ROADS

The railroad commissioners will leave Helena today on an inspection trip over the Butte, Anaconda & Pacific. They have just completed their trips over the Northern Pacific, the Great Northern and the Puget Sound, and after they have inspected the Butte line they will go over the Oregon Short Line. This will finish their work in the state, and their final freight rate statement for the year will be made shortly after.

RAILROAD DIRECTORS HERE NEXT TUESDAY

Word was received here yesterday to the effect that the directors of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound would be in Missoula on their way west on Monday or Tuesday of next week. The party leaves Missoula next Sunday and will be here by Tuesday. The directors are going west, where they will meet President H. R. Williams, with whom they will make a formal inspection of the entire system.
