TEMPORARY STATION IS IMPROVED

PRESENT BUILDING IS IN GOOD SHAPE—NOTHING DOING ON NEW DEPOT.

Benches have been put in the Puget Sound passenger depot now for the accommodation of the passengers and, with the numerous other minor, yet not insignificant, improvements which have been made during the past few weeks, the depot so much reviled and laughed at by the public is beginning to look like a real station. It is comfortable, at least, and it is a decided improvement over the freight depot.

EMERGENCY EXAMINATION.

CHARGE OF GAMBLING IS FILED

CASE OF PETE ANDERSON, FOR PLAYING SOLO, IN THE DISTRICT COURT.

County Attorney E. C. Mulrooney yesterday asked and received permission of Judge Webster in the district court to file an information against Pete Anderson, without the formality of a preliminary hearing, charging the defendant with gambling, for playing solo for money, on June 27 of this year. It was stated that Anderson had had a prior conviction on a similar charge.

An information was also filed against O. H. Dahl, charging him with obtaining money by false pretenses. It is alleged that Dahl, while acting as foreman for the Puget Sound road, was party to a transaction by which a time check was forged and the sum of \$52.50 obtained. He was brought into court, waived the reading of the information and took the statutory time for pleading. He will give his plea today at 10 o'clock.

IMPORTANT INSPECTION POSTPONED FOR A WEEK

Owing to the illness of Acting Superintendent Fowler, the inspection trip which General Superintendent Goodell was to make over the division today was postponed and the general superintendent returned to Livingston, after having gotten as far as Garrison. The trip which the two officials were to make was an important one. Mr. Fowler has not yet gone over the division thoroughly and Mr. Goodell is anxious to look over the various plans for improvement which have been made for the Rocky Mountain division.

CONDEMNATION SUIT IS FILED

PUGET SOUND WANTS LAND NEAR BITTER ROOT TRACKS FOR A SWITCH.

The Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound Railway company yesterday brought suit in the district court against Maria T. Higgins; Al Smith and William Treacy, executors, and Margaret Larson, executrix of the estate of Peter Larson, deceased; John M. Keith, administrator of the estate of John Woody, deceased; O. E. Peppard, Frank Woody, the Missoula Concrete company (a corporation), John Shryock, E. M. Lockman and J. R. Peters, for land near where the Puget Sound main line crosses the Bitter Root branch of the Northern Pacific.

The complaint recites that the land in question is desired by the plaintiff for the purpose of putting in a switch, connecting the Bitter Root branch of the Northern Pacific with the main line of the Puget Sound. The suit is brought against Maria T. Higgins, as owner of lots 9, 10, 11 and 12, in block 18, Sunnyside addition, portions of which are desired by the plaintiff, and against the rest of the defendants as owners of lots 2, 3 and 4, in block 18, same addition.

DR. UNDERWOOD ATTENDS EASTERN CONFERENCE

Dr. J. H. Underwood of the department of history and economics of the University of Montana left last night for Louisville, Ky., to represent the university in the third international conference on state and local taxation; to be held September 21 to 24. This conference of state fiscal officials and financial students will present to the state legislatures a measure for tax improvement of inheritance taxation. Dr. Underwood is a member of a committee of seven which has drafted such a measure.

ERECTORS BREAKING ALL RECORDS

STEEL ON THE HIGGINS AVENUE BRIDGE GOES TOGETHER FASTER EVERY DAY.

The third span on the Higgins avenue bridge was finished yesterday and, with the supports on this span all in preparation, will be made today for the raising of the fourth pair of girders. Superintendent Haney is making things fly on the structure with his crew of erectors and no grass is growing under the derrick wheels nowadays. Three pairs of girders in less than two weeks is a pretty good record, but at the rate things are going now there seems to be no doubt but that the record will be broken on the next three spans. The concrete work has all been finished and the north end is in good shape for the steel work there, so that there will be no delay to the work on that account. A crew is at present working on the approach to the bridge from South Higgins avenue and on the fill on South Third street and in a few days those streets will be in shape for the opening of the crossing.

Despite the fact that the steel work has been going on for nearly a month, there is still no lack of spectators and every day the temporary bridge is crowded with people watching the derrick handle the heavy steel and the riveters as they toss the little, red-hot bits of steel about, with never an error nor a mistake.
