## ROYAL HIGHLANDERS' CONVENTION

FRANK P. KERN OF MISSOULA SENDS HOME NEWS OF THE BIG MEETING.

Frank P. Kern of this city, who is at present in Denver attending the convention of the Royal Highlanders, sends the following clipping from the Rocky Mountain News:

"The Royal Highlanders, one of the largest of fraternal organizations, has severed its connection with the National Fraternity congress, which the executive castle of the Highlanders believes is dominated, or is beginning to be dominated, by the old line insurance companies of the country.

"The withdrawal took place nearly a year ago, but was publicly announced yesterday for the first time by President W. E. Sharp at the opening of the convention of the executive castle of the Highlanders at the Brown hotel. He alleged that the Fraternal congress is attempting to throttle competition among fraternal insurance companies by the establishment of compulsory rates of insurance.

"The convention will remain in session until Wednesday evening. There are in attendance 11 members of the executive council, 27 delegates, representing 11 states, and a number of visiting members and drill teams. The meeting was opened yesterday with an address of welcome by Governor Sharfroth, followed by addresses by various members of the order.

"Most of the time of the convention yesterday, after the appointment of the working committees, was devoted to discussion of the reports of the executive officers, which will be taken up for further discussion this morning. The convention meets but once in four years, business between conventions being transacted entirely through the executive castle.

"The exhibition drills and parades, in which the visiting delegates and teams and members of the local castle took part, were some of the most interesting features of the first day's meeting. The drill was conducted on Broadway, in front of the Savoy hotel, the Douglas castle team, Aurora, Neb.; Bonnie Doone castle team, Lincoln, Neb.; and Ida Grove castle team, Ida Grove, Ia., taking part.

"After the drill the three teams, led by a platoon of police and the Douglas castle band, formed the first division of the parade, which moved down Seventeenth street to Lawrence, thence to sixteenth street, Broadway and Nineteenth avenue to Ed's Jubel temple, where addresses were delivered by members of the executive castle.

"The parade was in three divisions. The second, led by Seigel's band, was composed of Enterprise castle, Denver, in carriages, and the president and executive officers and visitors in automobiles. The third division, led by the Denver cornet band, consisted of Broughty castle team, Denver, and numerous Denver Highlanders in carriages.

"One of the principal features of the convention will be the competitive drill, which will take place at the Overland park fair grounds this morning. Douglas, Bonnie Doone, Ida Grove, and perhaps the two Denver teams, will join in the contest."
