CALENDAR OF DISTRICT COURT TO BE PUBLISHED IN A FEW DAYS.

Yesterday was a busy day in the district court and the office of the clerk. Fifty-seven cases were set for trial, and the calendar will be made public in a few days. As now set, there are cases enough to keep the court busy until December 8 and the chances are that at the November term additions will be made. The November term commences on November 8, and for a week, or until November 15, there will be no trials; instead, the time will be taken in making out the calendar and drawing the jurors.

The session yesterday was extremely busy. Filippo Andonetti, charged with assault in the first degree, pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for October 18.

O. H. Dabi, alleged to have obtained money under false pretences, will have his trial on October 5.

Pete Anderson, charged with gambling, will be tried on September 29. The civil case of Maria T. Higgins against M. Schlossberg was ordered transferred to the district court of Powell county.
