"Near Etah I came upon the Old Polar's house in Thank God harbor, which had been used by the expedition of Colonel Dr. Hall in 1872. I found at latitude 81.44 a cuff on which was still written plainly the name of Sir John Lockwood.

Professor McMillan said that he came on the old headquarters of the expedition of Admiral sir George Nares near Cape Sheridan.

"Why was it that you and the others did not go to the pole with Commander Peary instead of Henson?" McMillan was asked.

"Because Henson was better fitted," he replied. "He was stronger and had more experience, was a better sleight driver and repairer and in every way was the man to go."
