EVANGELIST IS HEARD BY MANY

CLEARING SKIES BRINGS LARGE AUDIENCE OUT TO HEAR MR. BREEDEN.

The clearing skies brought a large audience to hear Evangelist Breeden at the Christian church last night. They were well repaid for coming, for the sermon was one of the ablest yet delivered by the distinguished preacher. "Repent or Perish" was the theme of the sermon. It was unfolded in such a lucid and strong manner as to profoundly impress every one who heard it. "Repentance is not sorrow for sin," said the speaker, "though it has its roots in it. It is sorrow for sin followed by the forsaking of sin. Men are hoping to escape the penalty of sin while they hold on to sin. The only way of escape from the penalty of sin is escape from sin. The young ruler who came to Jesus desiring to know what he must do to obtain eternal life was sorry because he was not told that he could be saved while still clinging to that which constituted his sin. There are three conditions upon which life can be obtained. These conditions are constitutional, not statutory. They are as vital as the conditions of natural life. They are faith, repentance and obedience. Of faith made perfect by repentance and obedience. Faith takes hold of life; repentance cuts loose from the world and faces toward God, while obedience yields to the laws that govern life." With apt illustration and telling incident the truth was driven home to the hearts of the hearers.

Tonight the theme of the sermon will be "The Conversion of an Infidel." This will be one of the most vital of the series and the public is cordially invited to hear it. Next to the splendid sermons of Dr. Breeden the people are enjoying the magnificent solos of Mr. Saxton.

The railway company is required to furnish a bond of \$3,000 that it will abide by the findings of the commissioners and pay their expenses.

VALLEY METROPOLIS IN DARKNESS

ONLY HALF OF LIGHTS OF HAMILTON ARE BURNING—NEW GENERATOR.

Hugh Ferguson, an electrical engineer at the head of the power stations of the Missoula Light & Water company, returned yesterday from Hamilton, bringing news of the dire straits in which that city has been placed by the breakdown in the power plant. The accident occurred two or three days ago, and the Hamilton people, unable to do anything with the big machine themselves, sent to Missoula for an engineer. Mr. Ferguson went at once to Hamilton and looked the broken generator over. The machine was in very bad shape and the company was advised to discard it and get a new and larger one to take its place. They are consequently looking for one, but with the plant broken down, the city is only half lighted. The moving picture shows have all been closed down, houses are without light, and the street lights are only on a part of the time. Hamilton is a fine town, however, according to Mr. Ferguson. "There is a third as much lighting business done there," he said, "as there is in Missoula."

PLAT IS APPROVED.

The county commissioners yesterday approved the plat of Cobban's camp sites in the Rattlesnake district and ordered it placed on file. The tract is located north of Park addition and on the west side of Rattlesnake creek. Part of the land is traversed by the creek. The plat was offered by the Missoula Trust & Security bank. The description given is the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section 14, township 13 north, range 19 west.

CONDEMNATION SUIT IN DISTRICT COURT

Suit was brought yesterday in the district court by the Northern Pacific Railway company against Frank Lusk and wife, Frederick Schosser and wife, Albert L. Flewelling and wife, Cyrus Cotton, the wife and the heirs of Cyrus Cotton, deceased, to condemn certain lands in the Coeur d'Alene valley near Rivulet. The plaintiff states that it proposes to straighten out its Coeur d'Alene branch line and that lands owned by the defendants are needed for the purpose. The land in question embraces portions of lot 7, section 25, township 15 north, range 25 west, and portions of lot 3, section 2, township 14 north, range 25 west. The plaintiff asks the court to appoint commissioners to appraise the lands and decide upon the amount of the award.
