MAN'S BODY FOUND NEAR HUSON REMAINS OF UNKNOWN MAN, PRESUMABLY A SUICIDE, DISCOVERED IN ROOT HOUSE. County Coroner W. D. Kendrick was called to about two and one-half miles west of Huson yesterday morning to investigate the death of an unknown man who was found in a root house at that place. George Campbell, foreman for Roberts Bros. & Droger, was near the root house on the Eddy ranch, which is not tenanted at the present time, and was attracted to the cellar by the odor coming therefrom. Upon investigation he discovered the badly decomposed body of a man, whereupon the coroner was notified. Mr. Kendrick drove overland, and when he went to pick up the body he found it in an advanced state of decomposition. Whoever the man was, he had evidently gone to the root house, taken off his gray coat and vest, which he used as a pillow, and prepared a bed by spreading burlap and pieces of paper on the floor. Lying beside the body was a .38-caliber Smith & Wesson revolver with two empty shells and four loaded ones. While the coroner has not yet made an examination of the body, it is apparent that the man had met death by his own hand. His shoes, which he had taken off before lying down, were found beside the body. There were no papers which would aid in establishing the identity of the suicide, if that is what he was. Nothing of value, excepting a 5-cent piece and a pocket knife, were found on the body. The man's clothing consisted of a coat and vest of some gray material, a soft black hat, two pairs of blue overalls, the outer pair being new, and a black shirt. He had a red, stubby mustache and about two weeks' growth of beard. The color of his hair could not be determined. The coroner believes that the man had been dead for at least two months. The body was brought to the city and will be examined today by the coroner. There will be no inquest.

Y. M. C. A. MAN TALKS TO STUDENTS GALE SEAMAN, SECRETARY FOR NORTHWEST, IN ADDRESS AT UNIVERSITY. At the special convocation held yesterday morning at the university Gale Seaman spoke to the men on the subject, "Destructive Tendencies in the Young Man's Life." Mr. Seaman is the northwest secretary of the collegiate department of the Y. M. C. A. In his opening words the speaker congratulated the students on the progress they had made in the association work since his visit last spring. He stated that he would speak of three agencies which tended to undermine the character of every young man. He enumerated these as lack of attention to small things, allowing one's will to be overpowered, and the abuse of certain trusts granted to every man. His first point, man's inattention to the small things, was brought out with telling force by illustrations of college cases bearing directly on the point. Referring to his second point, the speaker asked whether his listeners cared to allow their will power to be broken down to such an extent that they would follow others around as sheep. In conclusion, Mr. Seaman spoke of the urgent need of every man having some connection with an organization which stands for the greatest development of men in spirit, mind and body. This is the purpose of the organization, as he stated. "The Young Men's Christian association urges the care of the body, the growth of the mind and the development of the inner, higher, spiritual man. It stands for the elimination of those things which are recognized to be a hindrance to perfection of strong, virile, noble manhood."
