

YOUNG SCHOOL BOY DENIES SHE HIRED BOTH SIDES HEARD LEADERS' POSITIONS UNCHANGED

LOGIE ANDERSON, WHILE ATTEMPTING TO BOARD WAGON, MEETS INSTANT DEATH.

Children playing in the neighborhood of the Hawthorne school, in the Orchard Homes, about noon yesterday were horrified spectators of a tragedy which ended the life of Logie Anderson, according to the stories told by other children, got between the leading wagon and the trailer and attempted to climb onto the latter. He lost his footing in some manner and fell under the wheels, which passed over the upper part of his skull, killing him instantly. No blame is attached to Randolph, the driver, as he had repeatedly warned the children of the danger.
