

TELEPHONE MANAGER TELLS OF PLANS

R. B. WISEMAN EXPLAINS IMPROVEMENTS THAT BELL COMPANY IS MAKING.

Hamilton, Sept. 23.—R. B. Wiseman, district commercial manager of the Missoula district of the Bell Telephone company, has spent the past week in Hamilton looking after the company's interests. In speaking of the changes and improvements, Mr. Wiseman had the following to say: "During the past year our business has almost doubled and to meet this condition an additional pair of copper wires will be strung from Hamilton to Stevensville and connect from that point with a pair of wires to Missoula. This will provide two physical circuits to the upper valley, and, in addition to this, a phantom circuit composed of the two physical circuits will give a direct and private line from Hamilton to Missoula. The service at Hamilton and other Bitter Root points will be second to none. A complete exchange is now being installed at Victor, with 25 business and residence phones."

W. H. Roberts, who has been the manager of the Bell Telephone company's office at Hamilton for the past 16 years, on account of the great growth of his personal business, has given up telephone work in order to apply his entire attention to his store. He will be succeeded by D. W. Meeker, who has been with the company at Hamilton for the past two years.

TO BUILD SEWER.

Hamilton, Sept. 23.—At a special meeting of the city council, bids were

asked for the construction of 11,000 feet of 8 and 12-inch sanitary sewers and the necessary tanks within the improvement district recently created. The council condemned all wooden sidewalks on both sides of Main street between First and Fourth and one block each side of Second.

Hamilton, Sept. 23.—The new traction engine plow ordered some time ago by the Bitter Root stock farm arrived in Hamilton yesterday. The machine is the first of its kind to be used in the valley and will be watched with considerable interest, because of the amount of ground it will plow in a single day. The machine has 110 horse power, will handle 16 plows and will plow 30 acres a day. It will be set up within the next few days and put to work plowing 500 acres that will be sowed to winter wheat.

BIG MEN TO MEET BANNARD NOMINATED FOR MAYOR AT SALT LAKE

TAFT, PINCHOT AND BALLINGER REPUBLICAN CONVENTION IN GREATER NEW YORK NAMES THREE CANDIDATES.

Los Angeles, Sept. 23.—That President Taft, Secretary Ballinger and Gifford Pinchot may meet in Salt Lake on the president's journey westward to Spokane, where he is to deliver his set speech upon reclamation and conservation of the public lands, was forecast today when Mr. Pinchot left Los Angeles direct for Salt Lake City.

The head of the forestry bureau naively said that he had bought his ticket to Salt Lake before he learned that President Taft would arrive there at about the same time as himself.

"But I probably shall see the president," he added.

Mr. Pinchot declined to add anything about the forestry controversy, and said that he was enthusiastic as to the work of his department in the west as he found it on his western trip.

With the chief forester is John Hammond Hayes, who will join the president at Salt Lake City.

Fusion Element.

The fusion element is centered in a non-partisan committee of 100, a sub-committee of which has been trying for the past week to agree on candidates.

The Independence league delegate withdrew from the conference yesterday because the league would not be a party to "bargaining for offices," as the dissenting delegate expressed it.

Notwithstanding the Independence league's defection and some minor friction among the fusionists, the republican leaders say that the alliance in opposition to Tammany is still formidable.

The fusion sub-committee adjourned tonight without formally endorsing the republican ticket as selected, but in view of Mr. Woodruff's announcement its support is relied upon.

In the platform the convention mercilessly criticized "Tammany misrule" and proposed broad reforms, a reduction of living expenses by eliminating "the extravagances practiced by the McClellan administration," and an honest and efficient municipal government.

The nomination of Mr. Mitchell, a democrat, for president of the board of aldermen, was explained as that of "the only man in the present Tammany administration who has done his conscientious duty and exposed the graft in the departments under his control—particularly in the bureau of licenses."

Mr. Bannard, in addition to his presidency of the New York Trust company, is a director or trustee of a large number of other financial institutions. He formerly was commissioner of the board of education of New York.

MANY AT FAIR.

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 23.—The presence of Secretary of War Dickinson as the speaker on topics affecting the interests of the north and south attracted a great crowd to the state fairgrounds here today. General Frederick Grant, who is also a guest of the fair, reviewed a uniformed regiment of conscripts in front of the grandstand, himself appearing in the full uniform of a general of the United States army.
