## NOTES OF WALLACE

Wallace, Sept. 25.—Richard Daxon, manager of the Tarbox, Ben Hur and other properties in the Saltese district, has incorporated the Hamilton & Coeur d'Alene Mining company, capitalized at 1,000,000 shares. The property is located adjoining the Iron Mask and Glen Metals groups on Spring gulch in Montana. A crosscut tapped the vein opening 18 inches of cube galena while in the upper levels carbonate ore running 50 per cent lead and 20 ounces in silver to the ton was opened up.

Business men of Murray predict that inside of five years Murray will gain the position of metropolis of the Coeur d'Alenes, from which it was ousted by Wallace in 1892. Real estate has taken a jump from last year's prices to eight times that value since the advent of the Idaho Northern railroad in the spring, business is booming and scores of new men are being added to the payroll of the properties surrounding Murray.

The Mullan bowling season opens Sunday. A city league will be organized. Outside games are being arranged.

John Lee, Jr., a cripple who was arrested at Thompson Falls, Mont., this week for counterfeiting, had been a resident of Wallace this summer and fall, leaving here two weeks ago. "Fogleg" Lee, as he was called, made a business of chair repairing until a short time before his departure, when he began to sell watches. The police investigated Lee's business then and Lee informed them that he had been in the jewelry business in Kentucky.

The vein on the Buffalo Mining company's holdings near Saltese is being drilled on both east and west and strings of copper ore are being encountered. The ledge is 60 feet wide on the working level.

The crosscut being driven to the vein of the Ambergis from the No. 2 level of the Hercules mine is thought to be nearing the ledge, as the rock is becoming exceedingly hard.

## INDORSER OF NOTE FILES SUIT THREE MILE TO GET ELECTRIC PLANT

GEORGE LILL SUES AMADOR RAILWAY FOR REIMBURSEMENT.

A suit was filed by George Lill against the Amador Railway company, D. E. McKinnon and Robert M. Mahler in the district court yesterday. The complaint alleges that on May 10, 1908, the defendant company, through President McKinnon and Treasurer Mahler, gave a promissory note for the sum of \$8,000 to the Corn Exchange National bank of Chicago, and that the plaintiff, without promise of remuneration or compensation indorsed the note, along with McKinnon and Mahler. When presented for payment, on May 11, 1909, the money was not paid and the plaintiff was compelled to reimburse the bank for the entire \$8,000. He therefore sues for \$8,000, and interest at 7 per cent from May 11, 1908 until paid, from the Amador Railway company, and asks judgment against McKinnon and Mahler for the sum of \$5,333.33, two-thirds of the sum which he was compelled to pay to the bank.

### TRIES TO ESCAPE.

Omaha, Sept. 25.—Last evening while the patrol wagon was taking G. W. Marvin, the alleged Union Pacific train robber, back to jail from a barber shop, the wagon ran into a small street car riot on Furness street and the prisoner made an attempt to escape. He was clubbed into submission.

BIG DITCH COMPANY PLACES ORDER FOR EQUIPMENT FOR MODEL TOWN.

Hamilton, Sept. 25.—An order was placed by the Bitter Root Valley Irrigation company today for the machinery for a complete electric lighting plant to be installed at the model town of Three Mile. The machinery is to be delivered at Stevensville as soon as possible and work on the installation of the plant will commence as soon as it can be transferred to the site of the town. The machinery for the light plant will cost about \$3,000 and it will furnish light and power for the entire town including street and house lights. A thoroughly modern and up-to-date waterworks system is in course of construction. The well from which the water supply for the town will be secured is now in a state of completion and the reservoir is almost finished. Pipes for carrying the water through the town will be laid as soon as possible. The model hotel which the company is building for the accommodation of land buyers and visitors to the town is now nearing completion and when finished promises to be one of the most comfortably furnished hostleries in the valley.
