COMMISSION ADOPTS RULES

TENTATIVE SCHEDULE IS ARRANGED TO GOVERN CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES.

Cincinnati, Sept. 29.—After promulgating rules to govern the world's baseball championship series, the national baseball commission today vigorously criticized Charles W. Murphy of the Chicago National league club and imposed a fine of \$500 against the club. This action was taken upon a protest filed by the Toronto club of the Eastern league, based upon an alleged attempt of President Murphy to "coax away" Player Peffer from the Toronto team. The fine is to be applied as damages in favor of the Toronto club.

All the rules heretofore adopted by the National and American leagues will apply to the championship series, as well as the detailed rules adopted by the commission since these games have been provided for. The schedule follows:

LONG ISLAND DERBY COSTS ONE LIFE


MECHANICIAN BATES KILLED AND DRIVER LYTLE INJURED WHEN CAR SKIDS.

River Head, L. I., Sept. 29.—The smashing of every existing American record for automobile racing on the open road and a spill which cost the life of Mechanician James Bates and serious injury to another marked the running today of the Long Island Automobile Derby. The event was a stock car race and was run over 22 miles of hitherto untried road at the eastern extremity of Long Island, between River Head and Mattituck. The casualties were caused by the skidding of the Apperson car, driven by Lytle. Lytle and Mechanician Bates had completed less than two-thirds of the first lap, when the 60 horse power, tearing down a slight declivity at 45 miles an hour, suddenly lurched to one side into deep sand and overturned. Lytle shot clear of the car and landed 20 feet away on his back. Bates, however, clung to the machine and was crushed under it as it turned turtle. Both men were unconscious when picked up. Bates never regained consciousness and died an hour later, but there is hope of Lytle's recovery.

JEFFRIES IS TRAINED TO THE MINUTE

SO SAYS JIM PRATT, AT WHOSE QUARTERS JIM IS CONDITIONING HIMSELF.

Paris, Sept. 29.—James J. Jeffries, former champion heavyweight fighter of the world, is doing his work at Jim Pratt's quarters at Neuilly-on-the-Seine, a suburb of Paris, preparatory to his meeting with Jack Johnson, the colored fighter. Jeffries' training, which began soon after he returned from Marienbad, has been interrupted by a cold, contracted while he was attending the races, and for two days he was confined to his room. His wife, however, says his illness was not serious and it is expected that he will take up his training again in a day or two. Jim Pratt, who has followed the fighters for years, considers Jeffries in the pink of condition and ready to enter the ring with Johnson. Jeffries is as quick as lightning, he said today.

The treatment he underwent at Marienbad has reduced his superfluous fat and his waist line has fallen away practically to normal. His weight is about 225 pounds. All that Jeffries needs now is to get his muscles in trim, and I am sorry that his training, which was confined largely to punching the bag and skipping the rope, has been interrupted.

No definite arrangements have yet been made for a fight with Johnson, although Hugh McIntosh, the Australian fight promoter, has offered \$55,000 for a contest between these two heavyweights in Paris. Jeffries has refused the offers of several music hall managers to give sparring exhibitions.
