## JOHNSON GOES FREE BY VERDICT

JURY IN DISTRICT COURT ACQUITS FORMER RAILROAD MAN—A HEAVY FINE.

Johnson was accused of rifling a Northern Pacific freight car while working for the company. The information against Raymond Morgan, who was implicated with Johnson, has been dismissed by County Attorney Mulrooney. L. M. Morton, the third man accused of complicity in the robbery, turned state's evidence.

## MANY TIMBER CRUISERS ON NATIONAL FORESTS

In preparation for the large amount of railway construction which is scheduled for Missoula and surrounding country, the forest service is preparing to send out a large force of timber cruisers, who will spend the next few months in estimating timber along the proposed rights-of-way for the various railroads. Each party will be headed by an expert lumberman and will be composed of forest rangers and guards.

The work to be done in this direction is heavy. The right-of-way of the Clearwater Short Line, which for the most part, traverses the Lolo and Clearwater national forests, will be gone over as far as Kootenai. Then there is the line of the Puget Sound's Blackfoot branch, which follows the Blackfoot river to the Swan river country, where it follows that stream to the north. All of this line is practically within the limits of the Missoula and Blackfoot national forests. It is thought that several months will be consumed in the operations.

He is a man of splendid appearance and has a very pleasing personality. Agnes Leist Beebe is an operatic soprano with a voice of wonderful range. She has been associated with some of the noted opera companies of the country in leading roles. She has made as great a success on the lecture platform as in her former triumphs in opera. Mr. Phouts is one of the youngest violin soloists in America at the present time. He studied with Leopold Krueger and later became a student of Max Bendix and Michael Bannier. He afterward played in concert with the Duss Festival Military Band and Symphony orchestra. He became so popular that he was engaged last season for the lecture work, where he scored a big success. ## MINING ACTIVITIES ARE BEGUN

FOREST SUPERVISOR TELLS OF CONDITIONS IN ROCK CREEK DISTRICT.

Supervisor D. G. Kinney of the Missoula national forest returned yesterday from a two weeks' trip in the vicinity of Rock creek, in Granite county. He states that the improvement work, especially in regard to the construction of wagon roads and trails, in that region is progressing nicely. A wagon road has been completed and the trail from Hogback mountain to Ranch creek will be finished by November 1. Mining operations in the Georgetown district are looking up. The Crescent Mining company is just completing the task of constructing a 20-stamp mill and operations will be begun in a short time. This mine is on Stony creek, a branch of Rock creek, in Granite county. There are rumors to the effect that W. A. Clark, owner of the well-known Pyreneas mine, east of Georgetown, intends to retiler the property and start active operations, but no confirmation can be had, although the prospectors of the vicinity have faith in the idea. The Southern Cross and Cincinnati mines are said to be shipping regularly.
