Paris, Sept. 30.—James J. Jeffries, the American heavyweight, who has been training here for his proposed fight with Jack Johnson, said today that he had almost completely recovered from the cold which he contracted several days ago.

Jeffries expressed himself as disappointed at the manager offer of \$55,000 for a fight, saying: "I am the champion of the world. I have everything to lose and nothing to gain. Therefore, I won't want to fight for a purse of less than \$150,000."

Jeffries said that he considered himself in splendid physical condition. "I am quicker than I ever was," he added, "and am confident I can lick Johnson."
