EARLING IS PLEASED WITH BLACKFOOT

PRESIDENT OF PUGET SOUND HAS ADMIRATION FOR VALLEY—DRIVER RETURNS.

Bringing back the first story of an automobile trip that broke all records, Jack Hayes returned yesterday from the Blackfoot, where he helped show to the Puget Sound officials the proposed route of the new road's newest branch. The machine driven by Hayes—the Mercantile company's car—was one of the six that took President Earling and a party of directors up the valley for a distance of 68 miles, which is 16 miles farther than an automobile had before penetrated. The trip passed without accident, although, towards its latter part, it was found necessary to fell trees and to enlarge the trail of the engineers who had made the preliminary survey. When the automobiles could progress no farther, a wagon train took the railroad magnates on over the forest reserve trail and, after even this means of locomotion is impracticable, horses will be used. The directors told Mr. Hayes that they expected to return to Missoula by way of Kallispell and the Flathead reservation and that they would arrive here on Monday afternoon or evening.

Remarkable in many ways was the trip. Starting an hour and a half late, the motor caravan got to the dinner station on time and was on the schedule to a dot when the Ditz ranch was reached. Mr. Hayes says that President Earling, unreservedly and frequently, expressed his admiration for the country and his enthusiasm over its prospects. "The conditions are bet-

ter than they have been presented," is said to have prefaced a statement that everything is in readiness for the construction of the proposed line.

Taking the directors through the hills were six chauffeurs. Mr. Hayes is the only one to return, the others stopping in the upper valley to hunt.
