### MAIL TRAIN STARTS TOMORROW

RUMOR BILLS PUGET SOUND FOR FIRST TRIAL TRIP ON THURSDAY.

Tomorrow, rumor has it, the Puget Sound is to send out its mail train on its first trial run for the United States coast mail contract. The plans in regard to this train are being kept hidden and, so far as official information goes, no one knows anything about it. There has been a strong and well confirmed rumor afloat for nearly a month, however, to the effect that the trial run is to be started Thursday, and there seems no doubt now but that it will. The local officials know nothing at all regarding it excepting the fact that it is expected here Friday.

The hears of trumpets and the preliminary excitement which marked recent trials on the Great Northern is missing in this first run of the yellow cars. The Puget Sound is strictly an unknown quantity. The Great Northern, the Northern Pacific and the Burlington have all been in operation for so long that it is possible now to estimate the limit of speed attainable over their lines. The Puget Sound, on the other hand, has never as yet run a regular train over the whole length of its newly completed line and its capabilities are but matters of conjecture. So far nothing is publicly known regarding the real condition of the new line's track and roadbed. The road is, of course, shorter, but the matter of equipment and of track plays a heavy part. No tests have been made as yet to ascertain the speed which can be made over the mountains by the new route and the railroad world is eagerly watching for this first real run.

During the past six months a strong force of men has been kept at work on the roadbed from St. Paul to the coast. Every inch of track has been carefully graded and ballasted until every bit, on mountain as well as prairie, is as firm and smooth as could be wished. People who have traveled on the yellow cars have been astonished at the smoothness of the track, and the easiness of the riding is a new departure for this western mountain country.

With all of this preliminary work and with the best equipment on the road ready to speed the train on its westward journey it is reasonable to expect a good record and railroad men the country over are likely to be surprised when the mail train finishes its first trip across the continent.

Connor has a bad knee and he will probably not recover sufficiently to enter the game again this season. Hugh Forbis is also out of the game for a few days on account of a bad knee, he having received a sprain in last night's practice.

No game will be played next Saturday, but Coach White will keep the men practicing hard for the contest with the agricultural college in Bozeman a week from Saturday.

### DAUGHTER APPEALS TO KING ALFONSO

Paris, Oct. 12.—The daughter of Professor Francisco Ferrer today sent a message by telegraph to King Alfonso appealing to the monarch's generosity and chivalry to save the life of her father.

Ferrer has been convicted of instigating a revolutionary movement at Barcelona, Spain, and unless his sentence is countermanded in the meantime he will be shot tomorrow.

The socialists held a big mass meeting here last night as a demonstration of sympathy for Ferrer. Mr. Jaures, socialist leader in the chamber of deputies and other deputies spoke violently, denouncing the conduct of the revolutionist's trial, describing the proceedings as a judicial comedy. Some of the papers today characterize the outcome of the court-martial as a travesty on justice and that it may become a second Dreyfus case.
