A SPLENDID SHOWING IS MADE

NORTHERN PACIFIC SELLS RECORD NUMBER OF TICKETS IN GLENDEVE.

Glendeville, Mont., Oct. 12.—If conditions prevailing in the railroad service at Glendeville are typical of those existing elsewhere, there is little wonder that the Northern Pacific, at the present time, is hard to put to it to look after the business that is demanding traffic facilities over its lines.

There has been a phenomenal growth in passenger business at this point during the past few months, so that last month's receipts for tickets sold at this station were nearly double those of September last year.

The exact figures are: September, 1908, \$5,359; September, 1909, \$10,700. The relative figures for the month of August for the two years are \$6,288 and \$8,652.

That these large sales are representative of what might be called legitimate business and are not to be charged up to special rates, it is stated that only \$188 of last month's sales were for tickets to the Seattle exposition.

The Northern Pacific is face to face with the necessity of building a new passenger station here, and it is semi-officially stated that a new depot has been authorized for Glendeville and one for Miles City.

Whether the station here will be erected next year, or whether the railroad officials will wait to determine what additional facilities will be required as a result of the completion of the new Missouri river road, running from here to Mandan, remains to be seen.

A well-known railroad man, who is in a position to know, states that, within the next two years, will be witnessed a complete transformation in local railroad facilities; that the new passenger station will be built, as well as new and larger shops, with increased track facilities, and, in his opinion, the yards will be moved about two miles west of their present location, to the flat, leaving the round-house where it is.
