NEW TELEPHONE LINE IS PURCHASED

INDEPENDENT COMPANY ACQUIRES THE PROPERTY OF BITTER ROOT CONCERN.

The Bitter Root Telephone company has been purchased by the Montana Independent Telephone company. J. C. Hall, who has charge of the business for the company in western Montana, closed the deal, whereby the Montana Independent Telephone company is now the owner of the Bitter Root Valley Telephone company's property, whose lines extend from Corvallis to Darby, crossing the river at Woodside, the line extending south on the west side of the Bitter Root river, which it crosses again at Grantsdale, and extends south through Ward's Cove into Darby. This line is about 23 miles in length and has in operation at the present time 39 telephones, with orders for 26 more phones as fast as they can be taken care of. This line will be extended north on the west side of the river, through Victor and on to Florence, where it connects with the main line, running from Missoula through to Darby. The deal is considered a very important one, as it connects with some of the best ranches, as well as reaches Hamilton and Grantsdale. The company has about finished its plant at Stevensville and will immediately start on its toll lines in the Bitter Root valley, both north and south of that point, connecting the entire valley well connected up and ready to give service by the time the plant at Missoula is in operation.

Over 200 men are employed by the Montana Independent Telephone company at the present time in the construction work at Stevensville and through the Bitter Root valley. The equipment has already been ordered for Hamilton, which will be taken care of immediately after Stevensville has been completed. Under the efficient management of the managing director of the Montana Independent Telephone company, T. S. BIG SALE OF FRUIT HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR DIVORCE IS GRANTED TO MRS. HALEY

FRUITDALE RANCH IN O'KEEFE'S CANYON IS SOLD TO A DAKOTA COMPANY.

That fruit lands in western Montana are in demand is evidenced by the sale of the big Fruitdale farm, owned by Messrs. Black and Ray to a syndicate of North Dakota gentlemen headed by W. L. Nusselt. The purchasers have been figuring on this property for some months past and yesterday the deal was consummated. It is one of the finest farms in the state of Montana and the land is second to none as fruit land. The farm is located 10 miles north of the city and consists of about 2,100 acres nearly all of which is very choice land. There are now about 100 acres of orchard and during the coming year a large additional amount will be planted in trees. It is understood to be the purpose of the buyers to set several hundred acres within the next two or three years. The property is to be sub-divided and sold in tracts of 10 acres and upwards. The Dakota syndicate have a number of North Dakota farmers that they will bring out here and locate them upon these lands. There are also a number of our local people who are arranging to buy some of these tracts as soon as they are on the market. A large reservoir for holding flood water of the O'Keefe creek is now under construction and will provide an abundance of water for irrigation purposes. A number of other important improvements are contemplated. The cutting up of this large tract and putting the same under cultivation by a large number of small owners will be of great benefit to Missoula and vicinity and it will doubtless bring large returns to the owners. It is considered by orchardists that this land is peculiarly adapted to the growing of apples, pears, plums, sweet cherries and kindred fruits. It is also thought that peaches will do well there as the property is especially protected from the winter cold and is not subject to frosts. The price paid for the property has not yet been made public. The sale was made by the W. H. Smead company.

MILTON HENRY FINLEY SUCCEUMBS TO HEART DISEASE AT MISSOULA HOME.

Milton Henry Finley died at 7 o'clock last evening at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Finley, 1234 Poplar street. His death was due to valvular heart disease, complicated with dropsy, and came after an illness of a year. He was confined to his bed for the last two months of his life. He was born in Montana on January 4, 1891, but the greater part of his life was spent in Missoula. He was a member of the present senior class in the Missoula county high school. Besides his parents, he is survived by three sisters, Phoebe Aditha, Catherine and Mary Victoria, and two brothers, Clifford Sifton and Charles Aubrey. Quiet, unassuming, bright, Milton Finley found his death when life was good, when he was about to approach manhood, with everything worth living for still before him. A good student and boy with many friends, he was, although he never attempted to push himself forward or tried to make himself appear brighter or better than any of those with whom he studied and played. His very modesty and lack of self-assertion made him friends—friends who will mourn his death sincerely.
