The fair this year promises to be one of the most successful ever held and the interest in its details has been keen during the days and weeks of preparation. The booths are particularly attractive and the arrangements for the comfort and enjoyment of patrons have been carefully made. The supper which will be served each night during the week will be one of the pleasing features of the bazaar and will be well patronized—it always is; there are famous cooks amongst the good women who provide this feast. The donations to the bazaar this year have been generous; there are some splendid bargains and some rare opportunities presented in the list which has been arranged. To prevent any deception being practiced upon the public by unauthorized solicitors, the management of the fair has arranged that the book of each solicitor shall bear the official stamp of the Academy of the Sacred Heart. "Please tell the public to see that this academy stamp is on every book presented," said one of the fair managers last night.

## PLANS IS APPROVED

## HALF A MILLION

Nearly half a million trout fry have been planted during the past seven days in the streams of Ravalli, Missoula and Sanders counties. Those which were planted in this county were placed in the springs along the Frenchtown slough, where they will spend the winter; the high water in the river next spring will take them out into the stream and will put them in the way of finding homes for themselves. The Bitter Root received the consignment that was sent to Gavelin county and the Anglers' club at Thompson assisted Deputy Game Warden McCormick in disposing of the lot that went down there. The Missoula anglers' organization and its associate clubs at Hamilton and Thompson are doing good work in stocking the streams. President Parboe of the local club is right on the job and is enjoying the admiration of his fellow-members for the way he performs his official duties.

## MAGNIFICENT DISPLAY OF FRUIT

## APPLE SHOW PRESENTS FINEST EXHIBITION OF ORCHARD PRODUCTS SEEN HERE.

When the doors of the Western Montana Apple show are opened today the public will gaze upon the finest display of fruit and vegetables that has ever made its debut in this state, not excepting the fine exhibits that have been made at the state fair and elsewhere. This is the opinion of those who looked over the apples and vegetables last night. There are apples in cardboard lots; there are apples in ten-box lots; there are apples in one-box lots; there are apples on crates. There are pears and plums and prunes, and there are vegetables in endless variety and in great quantities. It is a fine show.

At 7:45 tonight Senator La Follette of Wisconsin and Senator Dixon of Montana will open the show with brief addresses. There will be a concert and the show will be declared open. It will be a good show if the attention is as good as the exhibits. No finer showing could be asked. Every-thing points to the complete success of the enterprise.

All day yesterday the installation of exhibits went on and far into the night. It will take hours of work this morning to get all of the exhibits in place, but when the work is finished there will be a show worth seeing. Decorator Brown has made the interior of the tent very attractive and the arrangement of the exhibits has been well done.

There will be a concert every evening during the week and the show will remain open until Saturday night. Several excursions are coming to Missoula to see the show; many visitors arrived yesterday, among them Con Kohrs who came over from Helena, and George H. Brown, who arrived yesterday afternoon from Butte.

Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock there will be started a auction sale of such exhibits as it is desired to sell. The auction will be continued until the last article is sold that is offered. Vegetables will also be in the list. One of the largest exhibits, that of the Bitter Root Irrigation company, is to be taken to Chicago for display as soon as the local show is concluded.

There is considerable interest in the automobile races which will be held during the week, under the auspices of the show committee. These contests will be entertaining and amusing. The entries will be announced tonight.

## COUNTERFEITERS ARE TAKEN TO HELENA

# LA FOLLETTE SPEAKS TONIGHT

WISCONSIN SENATOR ADDRESSES TWO MISSOULA AUDIENCES THIS EVENING.

Senator Robert Marion LaFollette is the leading politician of his native state. In national as well as state politics he has always been a leader, and his recent campaign as the head of the insurgent movement in the senate has made him a man of national prominence. He was born at Primrose, Dane county, Wis. June 14, 1855. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1879 and was admitted to the bar of the state in the following year. In the fall of the same year, 1889, he was elected district attorney of Dane county, serving in that office until 1894, when he was elected as representative to the Forty-ninth congress. He was re-elected for two following terms and was a candidate in 1896, but was defeated. He was elected as delegate to the republican convention in St. Louis in 1896 and to the republican convention in Chicago in 1904. In 1909 Mr. La Follette was elected governor of the state and served for two terms following until his election as United States senator in 1905. He took his seat January 4, 1906, and will hold office until 1911.

Tonight at the Barnols theater Senator La Follette will address the people of Missoula on "Representative Government." This will be the second number of the university lecture course. Ticket No. 2 will be used.

There will be no conflict between the opening of the Missoula Apple show and the lecture by the distinguished visitor and speaker. The exercises in the big tent will begin early, giving all an opportunity to attend the lecture afterwards. The apple show program will begin promptly at 7:45, the lecture at 8:30. Senator Dixon will open the apple show and introduce Senator La Follette, and later will introduce the Wisconsin senator to the audience at the theater.

This is the first time Senator LaFollette has spoken in Missoula, although other cities in the state have heard him several times. Every thinking person will want to hear him. Every thinking person will go to the theater to hear him.

It is very desirable that Missoula should make a favorable impression on the senator for important things relative to Missoula may be soon pending before the senate. The apple show will clearly present in the most emphatic way the possibilities of the country as a fruit raising region. It is to be hoped that a full house at his lecture will be ample assurance of the intelligence and progress of the people, indicative of their interest in the welfare of the country through a desire to hear what at least one of the eminent lawmakers has to say about the way things are being done.

Senator La Follette spoke Saturday night at Great Falls. "Tonight," he said before the teachers' course at Butte. "It is significant of his power and ability that he draws large audiences again and again in the same city and that everywhere he is received with enthusiasm and listened to with deep interest and close attention."

The lecture which he gives on this western tour is new. The material has not before been presented. It deals with present conditions and presents problems. The senator has many friends and acquaintances in the city. We hope his visit will bring him many more and will give him pleasant impressions of our city and of our people.
