

STATE LAND BOARD BACKACHE SIMPLY VANISHES MISSOULA MINISTER ACCEPTS IN INTERVIEW

DECISION OF NATIONAL OFFICIALS IS GIVEN IN REGARD TO SCHOOL LANDS.

The district forester has received a letter from F. H. Ray, secretary of the state board of land commissioners at Helena, stating that the board has decided to accept the decision of the United States secretary of the interior and the attorney general in regard to the recent case in which the state contested the right of the forest service to what were claimed to be school lands on the Flathead national forest. According to an act of congress, it is the law that sections 16 and 36 of a township are to be set aside as state school lands, unless they are otherwise selected by the government for military or Indian reservations, or for other purposes. But the state must survey these lands and the survey must be accepted by the land office before title passes to the state.

Some time ago officials of the forest service included section 36 at the north end of the Flathead national forest, and the state contested this action, basing its objections on the fact that the survey had been ordered and executed, the field notes having been worked up, and all that was necessary was the acceptance of the survey by the land office. Before the survey had been accepted, the forest service had included the land in the Flathead national forest. The secretary of the interior and attorney general held that until the survey had been accepted, the title to the land did not pass to the state, hence the forest service was upheld in its action. The forest service officials do not wish to appear arbitrary in the matter, as they were acting under orders from the secretary of the interior, when the land was included in the forest. All orders from the secretary are mandatory.

But the secretary of the interior and attorney general have held that the state has the right to make lieu selections for school lands. The state has held that the best lands, timber tracts, are included in the national forests, thus no lands of equal value from which the state may make its selections. The chief forester is now advocating a plan, which will be submitted to congress, by which a compact block of land in the forest may be given to the state as a lieu selection.

The stand taken by the state land commissioners, by which they accept the decision of the government, is a source of great satisfaction to the forest service officials, as they would not like to see the matter carried into the courts.

REV. W. H. BAGBY TELLS OF CENTENNIAL CONVENTION OF CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

Rev. W. H. Bagby, who has been in attendance upon the centennial convention of the Christian church in Pittsburg, returned to the city on Nov. 1 Thursday night. He reports a most interesting and enjoyable trip and the greatest religious convention ever held in Pittsburg, and possibly in the United States. Pittsburg was selected as the meeting place because of its being the only place large enough to take care of so great a gathering of people, in the immediate vicinity of the spot on which the Campbalian reformation had its origin, and because it was the home of one of the leading advocates of their plea, Walter Scott, a not distant kinsman of the famous Scotch novelist.

"The place was worthy of the occasion and the occasion of the place," said Mr. Bagby yesterday. "As already intimated, it was the greatest religious gathering Pittsburg ever saw. It caused the Sunday city to stir up and take notice as she had not expected to do. The local committee of arrangements had found it impossible to convince either the city or the railroads entering it that a convention numbering more than 5,000 or 6,000 could be gotten together. But when many times that many poured into the union station and swarmed out over the city, there was wide-eyed and open-mouthed astonishment. It was a convention that impressed the city not only with its magnitude, but also with its high character. Exclamations of astonishment and admiration were heard on all hands. Although it had come back to the cradle of its infancy it was almost a stranger there. Although such distinguished sons as Hon. T. W. Phillips and Senator Oliver were members of this communion, its strength was unknown to Pittsburg and Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania is now proud of being the birthplace of a religious body that in the comparatively brief space of a century has risen from zero to the fifth place among Protestant religious bodies in America, and that has upon its roster past and present, such distinguished names as Judge Jeremiah Black, James A. Garfield, Champ Clark and a host of others.

"The principal sessions of the convention were held in the auditorium of the magnificent Carnegie institute, a great granite built and marble finished pile that covers five acres of foundation and cost \$5,000,000 or \$5,000,000 of Mr. Carnegie's and is the magnificent gift of that princely citizen to the city of Pittsburg. The fortunate attendees upon this great convention received a double benefit that derived from the convention itself, and that derived from a study of the great building in which it was held. To have been able to get the full benefit of either would have been a liberal education. The convention fully met the most sanguine expectations of all who were privileged to attend it. In every way it was worthy of the great event it was meant to celebrate. The only regret felt by those present was that they would not be able to attend the next one."

DR. COOK LECTURES HERE FRIDAY

The data and information which he has been able to secure in regard to Barrill and the men who have made affidavits derogatory to Dr. Cook's claims regarding the ascent of the Alaskan mountain. Upon General Wood's arrival in Missoula, yesterday, Colonel Thomas C. Marshall, of this city was retained as local counsel and will assist the general and Mr. Mitchell in their work.

While Dr. Cook's representatives are reticent as to the exact nature of the evidence in the case that they have been able to secure thus far, it is known that they have in their possession, information of the utmost importance to Dr. Cook—and that they are prepared to present it in legal form in substantiation of the claims of the doctor that he scaled Mt. McKinley as he claims to have done.

Thorough investigations as to the character and reputations of every man who has taken an open part in the controversy against Dr. Cook have been made by agents of Dr. Cook and the information gathered is being put into form for use.

Last night C. G. Bridgeford, a resident of Hamilton, who has been in partnership with Barrill in the real estate business, and Fred Printz, one of the guides who was with Dr. Cook on the McKinley trip, and also made an affidavit recently in support of that made by Barrill, were in conference with Dr. Cook's special and legal representatives. Just what information these men gave to the inquirers the latter declined last night to make public. But following the conference and other interviews which the representatives had with others familiar with certain phases of the case, General Weed issued the statement to The Missoulian which is printed above. Mr. Mitchell declined to be interviewed at all, leaving the entire statement regarding the matter in the hands of General Weed.

General Weed will remain in Missoula until he has the affairs which have been placed in his hands in shape, then he will leave for Tacoma to prosecute the work which has been entrusted to him.
