CONSTRUCTION WORK IN FULL BLAST

DIRT FLYING MERRILY ALONG THE EAST END OF MISSOULA CUT-OFF.

There has been a strong and well-confirmed rumor afloat in Missoula railroad circles for the last two weeks to the effect that the Northern Pacific had dropped its work on the Lolo for the winter and that, until spring, nothing would be done.

Engineer Ray, who has charge of the work has been in the field for the last month and nothing could be learned from that source, but yesterday one of the resident engineers was in the city and the news which he brought will be more than welcome to Missoula people.

IN THE RAILWAY WORLD

POLES IN CARLOAD PUTS BAN ON UPPER SHIPMENTS BERTH

COPPER RIVER ROAD EXTENDED TEN MILES

Seattle, Oct. 24.—Word was received here today that the Copper River railroad, being built from Cordova, Alaska, into the interior, has been extended 10 miles within the last month, marking the completion of 82 miles of the expensive 200-mile project. Arrangements have been made to send an additional force of 1,200 road men to Cordova to rush construction work during the winter months. More than 3,000 men are already at work on the line.

KOKOVSOFF ARRIVES.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 24.—Dispatches say M. Kokovsoff, the Russian minister of finance, has arrived at Harbin, where on Tuesday he will meet Prince Ito, president of the privy council of Japan, to discuss the general situation, probably with regard to the railroads in Manchuria.

New York, Oct. 24.—It was announced tonight that Charles F. Murphy, and the entire executive committee of Tammany Hall will attend the funeral of Senator Patrick H. McCarron in Brooklyn on Tuesday. Murphy was a bitter political enemy of McCarron, but an admirer of his fighting qualities.
